GEN. WINCHESTER'S DEFEAT.

A letter from Gen. POOTER, commanding at Niagara, to Gen. DEARBORN, says, "The arrival of several officers of Gen. WINCHESTER's army at Buffalo, confirms the news of that General and his little army having been killed or captured. These officers state, that such was the hellish ferocity of the savages after the battle, that every person who, by wounding or otherwise, was incapable of marching, was instantly butchered by them! The General, and the remainder of his troops, are now crowding to the Niagara. The field officers are refused their parole."

Great News from Russia.

COMPLETE ROUT AND DEFEAT OF THE FRENCH GRAND ARMY.

RUSSIAN OFFICIALS.

From the Prince of Smolensk [KUTOUSOFF] to the Emperor—dated LANICKA, NOV. 11, (23). NAPOLEON, with his Guards, left Orsha on the 8th (20th) for Kohnovo; on the 9th (21st) the last of the enemy marched out from that place, leaving behind them 25 pieces of cannon, and 50 wounded officers. Platoff is in close pursuit of the enemy who is retreating towards Kohnovo.

His detached parties stretch from Slowbyn to the village of Toluschin, and likewise along the banks of the Dnieper.

ANOTHER LETTER.

From the same to the same—dated, MONTLOW, NOV. 15, (27) 1812. The whole army passed the Dnieper the 25th and 26th, and took magazines with 12 days provisions.

From General WITTEGENSTEIN, to the Emperor ALEXANDER—dated,

BUENAYA, NOV. 12, (24) 1812. On the 10th Tschichagoff arrived at Borisow, which had been possessed on the 9th by Adj.-Gen Lambert, who defeated Gen. Dombrowski's corps, making 3000 prisoners, and taking six pieces of cannon, with two standards. The remainder of the enemy fled on the road to Orsha.

From Gen. WITTEGENSTEIN, to the Emperor ALEXANDER—dated,

BORISOW, NOV. 23, 1812. I HAD the honor, on the 21st of November, to be submitted to report, that Marshal Victor and Oudinot were retreating before me towards Borisow. I marched after them from the town of Tschichagoff. Gen. Plawow followed the enemy's Grand Army. Admiral Tschichagoff, was to receive the enemy at Borisow, and by this means it was intended to inclose him on three sides.

THURSDAY, FEB. 18, 1813.

THE 29th BULLETIN OF THE FRENCH ARMY.

The 29th bulletin of the French Army gives the operations to the 2d December. As our readers have seen the 25th bulletin we shall not insert the summary of it which follows. THE RUSSIAN OFFICIAL ACCOUNT. Of the operations, states that after the attack and defeat of Davoust and Ney, Bonaparte left Orsha on the 20th, and took the road to Klykhanoff, or Kolkharovo, nearly half-way between Orsha and Bobr, on the direct road to Borisow and Minsk. The line of his march sufficiently shews that his wishes and object were to get to Minsk. The army thus marching upon Kolkhanoff, was followed by Platow, who seems to have been called off for that purpose from pursuing Beaubarnois. Oudinot and Victor, who had been on the Northern road, near New Lepel and Senno, descended first upon Borisow, followed by Wittgenstein. The movement of the main army under the Prince of Smolensk, we shall for the present avoid touching upon, in order to render the account of the operations of the other Russian armies more clear and distinct.

ENGLAND.

LONDON, JAN. 5, 1813. THE WAR IN RUSSIA.

Yesterday I reported to your Imperial Majesty that I should proceed to the river Beresina, near Studintzy, which I the same day accomplished. On coming up with the enemy at the above-mentioned passage they halted, and with a very strong force defended the passage, in order to save their baggage and heavy waggon.

Several Staff and General Officers were taken prisoners, besides others of inferior rank, and more continue to be brought in, which I have not yet been able to take an account of. The number of waggon belonging to government and private persons is so great, that a space of half a square is so covered with them, that it is impossible either to ride or walk through them; and three companies of the new raised militia have been employed merely to clear a passage for the army.

THE RUSSIAN OFFICIAL ACCOUNT.

Victor's corps, which at first took the same direction as Oudinot's, and marched upon Borisow, changed its direction, and proceeded up the left bank of the Beresyna. He was closely followed by Wittgenstein, who, on the 27th Nov. attacked him, and made about 4000 prisoners. He then surrounded Pautouereff's division, and forced it to surrender, to the amount of upwards of 8000 men. Bonaparte first endeavored to pass the Beresyna at Borisow, and sent Oudinot and Dombrowski to attempt it, but the *tete de pont*, established by the Russians on the other bank, rendered all their efforts fruitless. He then tried it about 10 miles from Borisow, and effected it. Wittgenstein followed him to the Beresyna, and Platow got to Borisow. Tschichagoff was on the opposite side of the river. Being thus able to act in immediate concert, the three Russian Generals attacked the enemy at once, on both banks of the Beresyna, and defeated him, driving back three wares, with great loss. A killed and wounded, and 1500 made prisoners. On the 29th (the day Bonaparte says he remained on the field of battle) the Russians took more than 12 pieces of cannon, and forced the enemy to throw a considerable number into the Beresyna. So great a loss also did Bonaparte sustain in baggage and waggon, that "the distance of 15000 was covered with them, so as not to allow prisoners to pass either on foot or on horseback."

THE RUSSIAN OFFICIAL ACCOUNT.

They leave the rest of the French army, which was 70,000 strong before, after the great battle of the 28th, retreating with all imaginable speed by Plehnech towards Wilna. Plehnech is now operating the loss of the French in that battle, which he stated the whole day, at 15,000 in killed and prisoners. So that the French may be said to be retreating with about 45,000 men, pursued by Wittgenstein, Platow and Tschichagoff.

THE RUSSIAN OFFICIAL ACCOUNT.

We come now to the main Russian army, under the Prince of Smolensk. We have no detailed account of its movements. But Lord Cathcart's despatch of the 30th Nov. stated, that it had used great care to cross the Dnieper on the 23d, at Kopyz, and that the remainder was to cross on the next day at the same time, marching by Starasle towards Bobr. His Lordship's next despatch, of the 6th Dec. is not more detailed, with respect to its movements, than his previous one. However, we know from it, that the advanced guard reached Borisow, and the rest was still advancing on a line parallel to, and southward of the main road from Smolensk to Minsk, but considerably in the rear of the present operations. We suppose the object of the Prince of Smolensk will be to get to the Warsaw line, thus interposing between the enemy retreating by Wilna and their resources. Of this force, so retiring by Wilna, we think a small part only will ever reach the Visula. "It scarcely appears possible," adds Lord Cathcart, "that the remains of his army can get through these difficulties in presence of so many troops with artillery and cavalry, regular as well as irregular."

THE RUSSIAN OFFICIAL ACCOUNT.

According to the accounts delivered into the War-Office at St. Peterburgh, from the correct details of the native commanders, the Russians have captured from the French in the present campaign, 128,000 men, 800 officers, of whom 25 are Generals, and 600 pieces of cannon.
