## Peter G. O'Brian Wins DFC; Father Got AFC in Last War

The old saying, "Like father like son," is well borne out in the case of the air-minded O'Brians of Toronto. A news despatch from London, England, last night told of the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross to Acting Squadron Leader Peter Geoffrey O'Brian of Toronto, "whose outstanding qualities as a leader set an excellent example."

The father is Group Geoffrey Stuart O'Brian, A.F.C., officer commanding No. 16 Service Flying Training School at Hagersville, who served overseas with the Royal Flying Corps and the Royal Air Force in the first Great War. Lawver, educationist and business executive, the first love of Group Captain O'Brian has always being flying, and in 1932 he set a Toronto to Edmonton record by covering the 2,000 air miles in twenty hours. Commander of an R.A.F. fighter

squadron for thirteen months, during which he showed himself to be a born leader, the 24-year-old acting squadron leader took part in "one of the longest night flights ever undertaken by a single-seater fighter—displaying good judgment and fine navigational skill," according to the citation.
