LINDSAY GUNNER IS AWARDED M.M. Joseph Gordon Tully Is Cited

For Bravery in Boulogne Area Fighting

Lindsay, March 2 (Special)—Cirr. Joseph Gordon Tully, of Lindsay, has been awarded the Military Medal for bravery in the Boulogne area Gnr. Tully was attached to the Royal Canadian Artillery and was born in Bobcaygeon. His wife, Mrs. Dorothy A. Tulley, lives at 10 Kent St. W. Lindsay. His citation

reads as fol-lows: ''On Sept. 23, 1944. during the attack on the fortress of Boulogne by an infantry brigade, while an artillery regiment was in close support of the brigade. Gunner Tul-Joseph Tully ly, under

shell fire, drove his carrier with skill and determination over roads known to be mined. On one occasion, during this attack, the observation post lost communication with the regiment due to a break in the remote control cable of the radio set.

"Gunner Tully, by his perseverance, driving skill under all conditions and willingness to carry out duties beyond those normally demanded of him, materially assisted in the rapid production of fire by his regiment, thus contributing to the

success of the operation,"
