One of the Lindsay returned men who has experienced the most thrills and hardships, along with pain and suffering is Cpl. Lloyd Hussey, son of Mr. and Mrs. W J Hussey, Colborne St. Since Aug 1942 and the famous Dieppe invasion, he has been a German prisoner at Stalig Camp 2 D. He can relate many a tale of "tough going," but talks very little. Just previous to being released from the German prison camp he was among the hundreds of Canadian prisoners of war who were forced to walk between 600 and 800 miles. He has been 5 years in the service.

Cpl. Hussey was tendered a thrilling spontaneous reception as he arrived in Lindsay, hundreds of friends gathering at the CNR depot. A long parade of cars was formed and the returning soldier was placed in an Army wagon and escorted home, where another big reception awaited him. Refreshments were served, with two aunts, Mrs. Garnet Corley and Mrs. Ernest Corley poured tea while four cousins served the people who kept gathering at the home until midnight.
