SGT. PHILLIP S. JOHNSON, LISTED KILLED IN ACTION

WAS ON FOURTEENTH OPERATIONAL FLIGHT OVER BELGIUM. WAS GRADUATE OF L.C.I. AND ATTENDED PETERBORO NORMAL. HAS TWO BROTHERS OVERSEAS.

The Daily Post and many friends of Mr. and Mrs. F. Johnson and family of town were very sorry to learn that their son, Sgt. Phillip Shuttleworth Johnson of the R.C.A.F. has been listed as killed in action.

He was reported missing in May, 1943. Phillip enlisted in Toronto in January, 1941, and received his wings at Hagersville in 1942.

Previous to enlisting, he graduated from Lindsay Collegiate Institute and also attended the Peterboro Normal School. He was an employee at the Dominion Arsenal here, just previous to joining the R.C.A.F.

He has one sister, Madelaine, at home and three brothers, two of them being overseas. Harold W. is a Corporal in the tank division in Italy, and Thomas Harvey, who is connected with the radio detection (wireless division) in England. Harvey before enlisting was employed at the Kawartha Lumber Co here.

Phillip was exceptionally well liked by his superior officers and crew, especially for his clear, coolheadedness.

His mother received two letters from him previously to his being reported missing last May, but had heard nothing since.

He and his crew were last heard from while on their 14th operational flight over Belgium.

The many friends of the family are hoping that Phillip will turn up some place well and strong, as does his mother, who said she still believed he was alive.

The young airman was in his 27th year.
