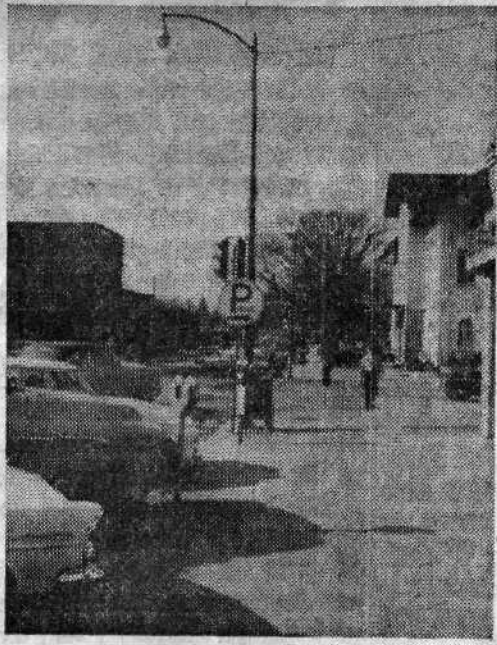

# ON THE MAIN STREET

Duncan McAlpine of Hollywood, California, is a former native of Eldon Township who for many years past has been an American citizen. In fact he to some extent is a deep dyed Goldwater supporter. Mr. McAlpine is visiting with his brother, R. J. McAlpine, a farmer living on the Lorneville-Argyle highway. Mr. McAlpine in Lindsay Tuesday upheld Senator Goldwater and said "I am one of 25 million voters who supported the talkative aspirant for the Presidency of United States. The U.S. visitor added that he was one of the Goldwater organizers in the district which is located some six miles from the corner of Hollywood and Vine. "I believe in Goldwater's policy favouring free enterprise and in that idea that he represents many small businessmen. He may have lacked diplomacy in his bold utterances and in the manner he handled recognized leaders of the party, but I am convinced that he was sincere and honest in his statements", he said. "Goldwater was all right on TV programmes but he lacked the support of newspaper columnists and these people seem to have a lot of influence. Eliminate daily newspapers

Detroit is however invaded by daily newspapers from many cities including the Toronto papers. "No one is giving in", said Mr. Rennie, "and it looks that way with the strikers and owners not making much headway.
