"Flavelle" was a prominent name in Lindsay business and sporting circles some years ago. "Cote" was a name prominent in sports in Lindsay at the same time. The names Flavelle and Cote will be remembered by many Lindsay people in another connection.

John Cote was the gentlemanly driver of the Flavelle phaeton. He sat on the top front seat while J. D. Flavelle usually sat alone in the deep cushioned backseat of the double-seated carriage. There was no top, or if there was, it was always down.

Last week former hockey days in Lindsay were recalled in an interesting talk with a son of John Cote — Leo Cote of Waterloo, was familiarly known to hockey fans and players as "Weasel". He was a left-winger on town league teams and one of the members of the Catholic Literary Association hockey team the year the team won the champion-ship.

He was prominent in 1907 when the famous Junior Midgets were formed and managed by Artie Parkin, Bill House and others. This team went on to be runners-up in the Junior O.H.A. but happened to be defeated in the Ontario finals by Stratford Midgets.

The same two teams with the same personnel met the following year in the intermediate finals and Lindsay Midgets were declared champions. Leo Cote was called to Waterloo and failed to make the champ-

Incidentally Cote, one of the stars for two years past on the Aurora Junior team playing in Lindsay, is a nephew of Lindsay's visitor — Leo Cote.
