He was born in Coboconk, attended public school in the village and then graduated from Lindsay Collegiate Institute. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed. reputation for good meals and hospitality.

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The late W. J. (Bill) Brown was the son of one of Lindsay's pioneer business men, Joseph Brown. W. J. Brown was widely known in business and fraternal circles.

Following his public school life he started out earning his own livelihood at a tender age and as time went on, he was engaged in the grocery business, milk business and prior to his retirement some years ago was engaged in the Welfare Department in connection with Mother's Allowance regulations and distributions in Haliburton County.

Fraternally he was associated with the Independent Order of Oddfellows for many years where he served faithfully and well.

Much of his younger life was spent in the summer months at Sturgeon Point where the Brown cottage was a gathering place for old and young. He was a kind and considerate gentleman and a friend of many people.

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The late Lawrence Gilkinson was familiarly known in the area as "Blondy". He was a gentleman with a keen sense of humour and a smile for everyone.

By strict attention to business he was for several years and up to the time of his untimely death Manager of the Brewery Warehouse in Lindsay.

In his business life he was the essence of courtesy and always obliging. In his private

life his greatest outlet for certain ability was as Secretary of the Royal Arch Masons, a position he filled faithfully and well for many years.

He was also well known to war veterans as a member of the Army in World War Two. "Blondy" Gilkinson will be missed by many, many people.
