That your grandfather, Robert Roberston was a member of Verulam Lodge from the time of its inception in about 1872, until the time of his death in 1875, and your brother Robert was a member and served as Wor. Master of Faithful Brethren Lodge, No. 77, Lindsay". "It is also interesting to note

that your Uncle John Robertson was the first white child born on the Scotch Line and the second white child born in the township of Verulam". Past District Deputy Grand Master McFadden spoke of his membership in the Masonic

order and that of his son Delmar and grandson David.

"I know you to be sincere in your religious beliefs, and generous in the support of your church with your time, talents and finances. I know vou have been staunch in vour support of improved education and improved standards of health, having served on the respective boards in your area.
