When Dr. Rice first plowed side roads and farm lanes in his homemade snowmobile, farmers looked on in amazement. It worked and many farmers thanked Dr. Rice and his snowmobile.

Dr. K. A. White was one of Lindsay's finest practitioners. He was also one of the first in Lindsay to drive an automobile, the brand known by the large brass fender lamps, the three feet high pneumatic rubber tires and a rubber bulb horn fastened to the outside of the front left door.

It is recalled that Dr. White was a born orator and was particularly good when expounding the cause of the Liberals, speaking in country school houses. Political meetings were well attended. The late Dr. White "met his Waterloo" at a meeting held by the Liberals in the school house at Reaboro. The audience was Tory almost to a man and they succeeded in not allowing the glib tongued Doctor to make his usual oratorical speech.

This same Dr White served as a member of the Board of Education and as a President of the Kiwanis Club. For a time he was a teacher in the Queen Street Methodist Church, then located at the corner of Queen and Caroline Street.
