It has been suggested that the clock be resurrected and set in place at the Armoury, a good idea. Other suggestions are that the clock be placed on iron stilts at the west end of the Town Hall and another that the clock be mounted in front of the Countv Museum. Another idea. that the clock be placed on top of the K of C building at the foot of Kent Street, if the building could withstand the strain of weight. In any case public opinion appears to favor setting the old clock in motion again, providing it is feasible. Perhaps it is time for less procrastination and for thoughtful debate and discussion.

Town council recently decided it was economically not feasible to mount the post office clock on the Armoury as suggested by the senior citizens.
