Fred Robinson has been a resident of Saskatoon for many years and has been successful in a line of the shoe business. He was an active member of Cambridge Street Methodist Church.

In a recent letter Mr. Robinson mentioned another former Lindsay business man, Fercy Coad, who for many years ran a drug store in Lindsay. Both these gentlemen are particular friends of Mrs. W. G. Dunoon, Kent Street West.

For many years Leon Koyl, of Lindsay, was a successful
