He was a progressive and industrious individual and when he moved to a high piece of land on the Verulam, road he erected а fine brick home and a modern barn. Not content with the meagre profits he started a small dairy business starting with a few head of cattle and a milk route of 10 customers when the set price was 10 cents a quart. He built his patrons up to over 300 and increased his herd accordingly. At the time Tom Hutton stated no one would ever be without milk where there were child ren but some families had no money and many dozens of quarts were never paid for.
