Last week hundreds of people filed in and out of the Mackey Funeral Home as they paid their last respects to three very estimable people.

Miss Lorna Elizabeth Baldwin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Baldwin of Sylvan Crescent, was well known to many citizens of Lindsay and district because of her business ability as manageress of the local branch of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

Her association with the law firm of Frost and Frost and her dedication to young people's work at St. Paul's Anglican Church.

Miss Baldwin was one of the founders and a past president of the Lindsay Business Girls' Organization.

Rev. David Lemon, rector of St. Paul's Church, and Rev. Canon Hesketh of Peterborough, formerly of St. Paul's Church, referred to the loyalty and faithfulness of the deceased in connection with different church organizations.

Miss Baldwin is survived by her parents and by one brother Grant.

Mrs. Alda Squier, whose funeral was held Monday, was the wife of the late Charles Squier, founder of the fancy pea industry which for many years was located at the corner of Russell and Victoria Avenue.

The late Mrs. Squier was

the daughter of the late Richard Sylvester, founder of the Sylvester Implement Company which was located at the corner of Kent Street and Victoria Avenue, a company which pioneered the manufacture of plows, binders and seed drills.

The late Alda Sylvester was born in the beautiful Sylvester home at Victoria Avenue and Peel Street. In her younger years the deceased lady was active in organizations connected with St. Paul's Anglican Church, and as an athletic girl, she was a member of a young women's hockey team.

Mrs. Squier is survived by two daughters, Margaret (Mrs. Robert Myers) and Dorothy (Mrs. Stewart Betts) both of Toronto, and by a son Jack of Montreal.

The late Wilfred Crowe M.D. practiced for many of his years in Minden and Lindsay after leaving his hometown of Orangeville. He was one of the first medical men to offer his services at the outbreak of World War II when he joined the British Medical Corps and had the terrible, yet thrilling experience of being a prisoner of war in Greece.

As a physician he rendered invaluable service. While practicing in Lindsay he served as coroner and as Medical Officer of Health.

Mrs. Crowe also had the

distinction of serving as a Canadian attached to Canada House in London.

The late Dr. Crowe was a kind gentleman, a dedicated doctor and a good citizen.
