Conductor Barnsley had no trouble being elected to town council where he served faithfully and well for several years. Genial, smiling and obconductor Barnsley liging, always "made the grade". In conversation with conductor Barnsley's son Warry of Oshawa, it brought back many memories, like the days when Fred Reeves, a burly and good looking six fcoter, was a member of the Lindsay constabulary and became operator of a first class pool and billiard parlor in the Tangney block.
