With FORD MOYNES

was located at the corner of Russell and Mill Streets and Ontario Bank, formerly the Standards, was at the corner of Kent and York Streets.

The Victoria and Grey Trust, for years at the corner of Kent and Cambridge Streets.

The Royal Bank was located at the corner of Kent and William Streets. The defunct Farmer's Bank and the Home Bank occupied the present store on Kent Street, now the Lindsay bakery, well known as "Grahams".

Rambling on Kent Street it is surprising to notice that there are a number of landmarks still in existence and enjoying generous patronage.

For example Tangney Furniture, McCarty's Jewellers, Boxall and Matthie and Edwards' hardware stores, Houzer's Men's Wear all under their original names.

Gregory's drug store, the oldest in Ontario, is still using the same name and operated by the Gregory family.

Others are Mercer's, now Tamblyn's drug store; the Olympja restaurant still under the name of Tozios; Drury's grocery at William and Peel, is close to the century mark and Walker's jewelry was for many years known as Beall's, one of the oldest jewelry stores in Ontario.

The men's store operated by Rhys Williams was founded many years ago by M. J. Carter. Walker's department store was for many years Dundas and Flavelle and dates back a century.

Lindsay banks date back to the days when the Bank of Montreal locally was the Bank of Upper Canada, with a bank

at the south east corner of William and Glenelg Streets. The first Bank of Montreal
