THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

EXCITEMENT IN ST. LOUIS.

St. Louis, July 25.—Considerable excitement exists today. The British Consul's office was crowded with persons claiming the protection of the British flag, to exempt them from enrollment in the militia under the recent order of the Governor.

An excited crowd gathered around, and many indignant citizens were present to punish the perfidy of American residents having families and business permanently located here, who, in their hour of peril, seek to seek from duty by enrolling themselves as subjects of Great Britain.

New York, July 23.—Col. Charles, of the Tammany regiment, released by the rebels, is here. He saw the iron-clad ram, and also a small iron gun-boat at Richmond, and gives a description of the former. The rebel Government treat our wounded the same as their own. The rebel officers admitted that their own and our wounded were dying so fast that they could not bury them.

Col. Charles says the working classes of Richmond are Union at heart, but the despotism of the Government prohibits the discussion of politics except in the newspapers.

The Government was disposed to view the execution of Mumford, at New Orleans, as a murder, and make the demand for Butler, and in case of refusal to hang Gen. McCull.

St. Louis, July 23.—A merchant of Fredrick has arrived here and reports that desperate fight had taken place at Greenville, Wayne County, Mo., between a band of guerrillas and seven companies of State militia, under the command of Capt. Leeper. They were surprised by the guerrillas who were under the command of a man named Reeves. The guerrillas made the attack at daylight very fiercely and suddenly, the militia being out to surprise our men of their approach. Captain Leeper and forty-eight of his men are reported killed, and a large number wounded. The rebel loss is not known. The rebels took possession of the town.

Detroit, July 22.—There was an immense meeting this afternoon on Campus Martius, in aid of the enlistments under the recent call for troops.

Stores and factories were, generally, closed throughout the city.

Resolutions were passed, requesting the City Council to pay a bounty of \$50 to each unmarried and \$100 to each married man enlisted in the regular army, to be raised in this city. Liberal private donations in addition were offered, and the greatest unanimity prevailed.

PARK HARBOR.—We learn from W. T. Wilson Esq., that a robbery was committed on the agency of the Gore Bank, at Simcoe, on Saturday or Sunday night. We are happy, however, to state that the burglars only managed to secure the sum of \$200 in silver coin. From Mr. Wilson we glean the following particulars: On Monday morning, Mr. Campbell, the agent, on going to the office found the door had been opened, and on proceeding to the vault, found that it had been blown to pieces, as well as the safe inside the vault, which had been forced by powder and heavy iron bars, some of which and powder-flasks were left behind. The robbery occurred away from the bank, belonging to H. Groff, Esq., the County Treasurer, having valuable papers. Fortunately Mr. Campbell had the bank notes elsewhere, in a place of safety, as previous attempts within the last few years had been made to rob the bank. No clue has yet been obtained, but the impression is that they are a gang of American burglars.—*Mont Herald.*
