EXECUTION OF JOHN YATES BEALL.

(From the N.Y. Advertiser ) John Y. Beall, the Lake Eric pirate and spy, was hung upon Governor's Island last Friday, and the majesty of the law was vindicated.

The execution took place at a quarter to one o'clock. It was to have taken place on Saturday 18th, but owing to some informality in the sentence it was postponed until Friday. The cause of the postponement was because the s ntence was appointed to be executed on Saturday, contrary to the usual custom of making Friday the day for carrying out the order for

capital punishment. His last night was spent in sleeping, he retired at the usual hour, and arising at seven o'clock this morning. Breakfast was soon after served to him, and he ate heartily of beef-steak. and partook of his coffee with evident sutisfac tion. After finishing his meal, he was waited upon by a barber of the garrison, who perform-

a tonsorial operation upon him.

The prisoner, since his conviction, was conn a dark cell on the north of the sallyport. The cell was perfectly dark, and no persons were permitted to visit the condemned man without a special pass. As it was, but few persons have had an interview with him since his sentence, the regulations being very strict in this regard. His mother paid her last visit on Saturday, and the interview was what might have been expected under the circumstances. When she parted from her son both were much affected, although the separation was not characterized by any boisterous demonstrations on the part of either.

At half-past twelve o'clock, Captain Talman Provost Marshal of Fort Columbus, and United States Marshal Murray, waited upon the prisoner and told him to prepare for marching to the place of execution.

He expressed his readiness to proceed in that olemn march, and gave the officers every possible assistance in adjusting the cord about his neck and pinioned his hands behind him.

He received the officer, as they entered his cell, with a smile, and said to Marshall Murray, C. Gowan, of Toronto, and Mrs. Scanlan, of I want the matter to be done as quickly as possible, and I suppose it will be but a physical effort, after all." As soon as the noose was fixed around his neck, and the black cap placed

upon his head, the procession was formed. The appearance of the prisoner as he was proceeding in this, the last march he would ever take on earth, was characterized by the most wonderful self-possession.

Two or three times he lost the military step, and immediately took the short-step to keep time. As the procession reached the brow of the hill overlooking the gallows, it halted for a few moments. Dorion on the resolutions adopted by the Confederation Conference at Quebec is the only heavy shot to which the scheme has been expesed, and, so far, the execution does not appear to have been very great. A good part of the four hours he occupied was spent in endeavoting to vindicate his own position in relation to that subject and the Intercolonial Railway. One general conclusion authorized by the hon. member is this, viz., that when a man goes into a government he gets considerably tamed down and toned down. He has to knuckle pretty often or has to take a sudden leave, as the Hon. John Young did when he found he could not have his imperious will in regard to the commercial policy of the country. So. in the interetices of M. ANOTHER SERIOUS ACCIDENT ON

THE GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY. A TRAIN GOES DOWN THE EMBANKMENT.

Another sad accident occurred on the Grand Trunk Railway, on Thursday night, one and a half miles east of Petersburgh, and five and a half miles from Berlin. As the Day Express Train, which left St. Mary's at 4,35, was leaving Petersburg at 7 o'clock, and when the above distance from the station, owing to some at present inexplicable cause, the cars were thrown from the track. and all but the engine and tender were precipitated down an embankment between 20 and 25 feet deep. The train consisted of two passenger cars, post-office and baggage car, and engine tender. The three cars went over the embankment, the couplings having broken, and the engine and tender remained on the track. The wheels of the tender were off, and all the gearing smashed up. The cars lay at the bottom of the embankment. one bottom upwards, and the others on one side. About 45 or 50 people were on board at the time, nearly all of whom were cut and bruised, but none killed outright. Mr. N. London, both received very serious injuries; it is feared that Mr. Gowan can hardly recover. Mrs. Scanlan, it is feared, has received very bad injuries, but we are unable to state if they are likely to prove mortal.
