A HINT TO HORTICULTRISTS-One of the speakers at a recent meeting PENMANSHIP of agriculturists in New Haven, gave the following directions for taking trees from norseries. He said :-

"An enormous amount of money is annually lost to tree purchasers by rude and unskillful taking up. Trees are torn up by the roots, as if the trunk and branches were the one necessary, and the roots superfluous. The proper way is, to open a trench on each side of the tree with a common spade, keeping the edge toward the tree, so as not to cross a root. These trenches should be far enough from the tree to avoid the main roots, and deep enough to go below all except a tap root, which may de cut off. HINTS ON CELLARS.

Cellars under our dwelling houses are generally deemed indispensable. They are certainly very usefull; but there are evils of such magnitude connected with them, that some have advocated their non-construction. They are almost universally manfactories of foul air, which finds its way upwards by means of doors windows other superior whiskeys.

**HOTEL-KEEPERS supplied on the most stairways, and crevices in the floors, and diffuses its noxious elements Canadian and imported Ales and bottled Porter through the rooms above, and become a fruitful source of disease; and again, they serve as a harbor for rats and mice, in the mode in which they are usually constructed, affording access to the side walls from below. It is not necessary however, that they should be infested with vermin or fill ed with half rotten garbage, to produce the results spoken of. The sur face of the earth is composed of decomposable substances, and whereever the air is confined in one spot, it becomes saturated with various exhalations deleterious to heatlh. Means must be provided, therefore, for their thorough ventilation, or cellars must be totally abandoned. A cellar, to fully serve its purposes, should be cool in summer, impervious to frosts in winter, and at all times free from moisture. The wall should rise at least one or two feet favourable terms above the level of the surrounding ground, and should be laid in good Splendid Oysters regularly received lime mortar, or at least pointed with during the season. A call invited. it. The thickness of the wall should not be less than fifteen or eighteen inches; and if the house walls above be built of brick or stone, two feet is preserable. The cellar should have a connecting drain at its lowest corner, which should always be kept free from obstruction; and each room in it should have at least two sliding sash windows to secure a good circulation of air. In very close climates, those portions of the wall above the surface of the ground should be double, either by means of a distinct thin wall on the outside, or by lathing and plastering on the inside, and be furnished with double windows as a farther security against frost.
