The Detroit Convention.
The general Convention of the representatives of the American and British American Boards of Trade was opened at Detroit on Tuesday last. The attendance of delegates from various points numbered upwards of four hundred. The proceedings were opened with prayer by the venerable Bishop McCloskey, of the Anglican Church. An address was then read by Joseph Aspinwall, Esq., President of the Detroit Board of Trade. Barton Able, Esq., of St. Louis, Mo., was elected chairman pro tem. The Convention then adjourned to meet again on the following day. Gen. Walbridge has been elected President of the Convention. It is said that he is favourable to reciprocity. The various committees have been struck. The delegates from the British Provinces do not sit as members on any of the committees, but will send gentlemen before them to discuss questions referred to the committees. The reciprocity question will come up at once.

School Pic-Nic.
On Friday last the Common Schools of Cannington and vicinity held a very pleasant and successful pic-nic in Joliffe's grove. Over 500 people were present. Speeches suitable to the occasion were delivered by the Rev. Mr. Reid, Rev. Mr. Gee, George Young, Esq., B. A., Principal of the Oakwood Grammar School, and others. J. Hall Thompson, Esq., Warden of Ontario, presided.

School Teachers' Convention.
By reference to a report in another column it will be seen that the Teachers of Victoria have organized themselves into a Teachers' Association. The step is most commendable, and we trust that an effort will be made to place it on a useful and permanent basis. Such an Association, properly conducted, cannot fail to have a healthy and beneficial effect. It will create a friendly feeling among those engaged in this high and noble calling, and aids to improvement in the modes of imparting instruction will be afforded.

Disgraceful Proceedings.
We have received letters giving statements pro and con relative to a disgraceful row in Verulam, which arose out of a prosecution under the Temperance Act of 1851. We gather that a couple of magistrates were maltreated, and that two or three of their friends or relatives were badly beaten. The constable was also struck in the mids. We decline publishing either of the letters. The first convention will be held in Lindsay, commencing on Tuesday, the 8th of August. We hope to see a large attendance of teachers, and the friends of education.

Evening Services.—Our readers will bear in mind that the Sunday evening service in the English Church has been changed from seven to half-past six o'clock; and that of the Wesleyan Methodist Church from half-past six to seven.

EARLY.—We have to thank Mr. Richard Wilson for several fine large cucumbers from his garden. The largest was about six inches in length. They were grown in the open air. Pretty good for this hyperborean region.

FIRE.—Last week the Dwelling House, Stable, and Barn, the property of Mr. John Daniels, Fenelon, was totally destroyed by fire. We have received no particulars.

NOT ON HAND.—The Legislative Grant for school purposes has not yet been received by the County Treasurer; but so soon as it reaches him teachers may rely that it will be promptly distributed.

THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF SIMCOE last week passed a By-Law, under the provisions of Dunkin's Act, prohibiting the issuing of licences, and the sale of intoxicating liquors in the county. The By-Law is to be submitted to a vote of the people in October next.

NEW BRUNSWICK has at present no Postmaster General, no Auditor-General, and, practically (being absent on his "pleasure trip" to England), no Attorney-General. The St. John Telegraph—our authority for the statement—seems to think it rather a matter of congratulation than otherwise.

THE "TWELFTH" OF JULY IN LINDSAY.

A LARGE NUMBER OF VISITORS.
GRAND PROCESSION.

EVERYTHING PASSED OFF QUIETLY.

The celebration in honour of the "Glorious, Pious and Immortal Memory" took place in Lindsay on Wednesday as usual. The morning looked rather threatening, and no doubt deterred many from coming out; yet the gathering was larger than any assembled here for several years. In all seventeen lodges were represented. Eleven came in on the train, two belonged to the town, one from Cameron's Corners, one from Cambray, one from Mayers, and another from Sheriff's Corners. It was estimated that about four thousand people visited the town. On the arrival of the train, a procession was formed, which marched through the principal streets, headed by the Port Hope Brass Band, to the Northern extremity of William street, where an address was delivered by the Rev. John Vickers, B.A., whose remarks were cut short by a heavy rain, which prevented any more speech-making, and hurried the crowd, in no very orderly manner, to a shelter from the storm. Dinner was the next consideration; and ample preparations had been made by the enterprising hotel keepers of the town for all demands in this line. Numbers dined at the Jewett House, Baynton's, Fournier's, Steele's and Veitch's, where numerous tables groined beneath a profuse supply of well cooked and well-served eatables. Between the dinner hour and the departure of the trains our visitors spent in inspecting the shops, County buildings, &c., and at 3 o'clock a large number of the townspeople assembled at the railway station to see the Port Hope brass band. The trains were tastefully decorated with flags and evergreens; and the excursionists bear testimony to the careful provision made for their comfort and convenience by the Manager and Superintendent of the P. H. & L. Railway. The trains moved away amid the vociferous cheers of the on-lookers, who were loudly returned by the departing excursionists, who seemed to have been highly pleased with their visit to our thriving town.

Between three and four hundred excursionists from Boboyoung and Fenelon Falls intended visiting Lindsay, but owing to an accident which happened to the machinery of the steamer "Ogemaw" they were unable to come up the river.

ADDRESS BY REV. MR. EDWARDS.
After seeing their brethren and visitors homeward bound, the Orangemen of Lindsay and vicinity repaired to the Wesleyan Methodist Church, where they were addressed by the Rev. Mr. Edwards, who based his remarks on the words "Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a disgrace to any people." The reverend gentleman spoke at some length on the far-reaching and highly important results of the victory won by the estimable Prince whose memory they revered, and which event they had that day assembled to commemorate. He then in a number of apt illustrations, showed how the Divine Providence had worked great events for the promotion of God's wise purposes, and for the advancement and prosperity of the country which, above all others, acknowledges Him, proving that "Righteousness exalteth a nation." He concluded by earnestly and affectionately impressing on his hearers the importance of holding fast to the principles inculcated by the Bible, and fashioning their lives after the pattern furnished by their risen Lord and Master. After singing a hymn, the benediction was pronounced and the meeting dispersed.

SUPPER AT JOYNTON'S HOTEL.
The quiet and orderly proceedings of the day were brought to a pleasant termination by a Supper at Joynton's Hotel. At eight o'clock the members of the town lodges and guests to the number of sixty sat down to a repast got up in splendid style by friend Joynton. The Chair was ably filled by Mr. Thomas Foley, supported on the right by Councillor Bell, and on the left by Mr. Lyons. After the cloth was removed, the following loyal and patriotic toasts were proposed from the Chair and duly honoured:—"The Queen";—"The Prince of Wales and the rest of the Royal Family";—"The Governor General";—"The glorious, pious and immortal memory of King William" (drunk in silence);—"The Grand Orange Lodge and Grand Officers";—"The Orange Order." A number of volunteer toasts followed.

Mr. C. B. Robinson proposed the Corporation of Lindsay, coupled with the name of Councillor Bell.

Mr. Bell briefly responded on behalf of the Town Council, and thanked his friends for the kind manner in which they had received his own name.

The Chairman proposed the health of Bro. Winters, District Master. (Cheers.) Mr. Winters responded in a neat speech.

Mr. C. B. Robinson proposed the Merchants of Lindsay, referring to their high character as business men, and the laudable enterprise which they displayed in catering to the wants of the public. The County of Victoria had good reason to be proud of the position, character, and enterprise of the Lindsay merchants. (Hear, hear.)

Mr. W. J. Robinson and Mr. Foley responded on behalf of the merchants. Mr. Robinson, in the course of his remarks, alluded to the great Detroit Convention—the largest and most influential assembly of commercial men which had ever come together on this continent. He hoped their deliberations would result in mutual benefit to this Province and the neighbouring Republic, and that the intercourse of the leading business men of the Colonies and the States would tend to remove misunderstandings, cement a friendship which nothing could disturb. (Cheers.) He (Mr. R.) was proud of the position of a merchant. He had never paid attention to anything else, and he hoped always to be a merchant. Mr. Robinson concluded by thanking the company for the cordial manner in which they had received the toast.

Mr. Jeffrey proposed the health of Mr. Robert Douglas, Master of '95.

Mr. Douglas, in response, made a humorous speech which was well received.
Mr. W. J. Robinson said that amid the numerous toasts which had been proposed, one important interest had up to that time been neglected. He alluded to the Mechanics (Hear, hear.) He felt sure that he had only to propose the Mechanics of the Town of Lindsay to have the toast duly honoured. (Cheers.)

Messrs. Jeffrey, Douglas and Johnson responded.
Mr. Douglas proposed the Legal Profession Mr. Herbert Thirkell, la. student, responded in a neat and effective speech.

The Chairman proposed the Press.
Mr. C. B. Robinson, of the CANADIAN POST responded.

The Band was next proposed from the Chair.
Mr. Graham, Bandmaster, responded. He felt ashamed that they had not a better Band in Lindsay. The fact was they received no encouragement. Did a few of the leading men—such as Squire McDunnell—lend their aid and encouragement to the undertaking, a Band could be got up which would be a source of pride and satisfaction to the town.

The Ladies having been proposed, Mr. S. Porter responded.

The Chairman, in felicitous terms, proposed Our Host and Hostess.

Mr. Boynton, in responding, said it gave him much pleasure to see the company enjoying themselves so well, and he hoped they might all spend many such pleasant evenings together. As far as he was concerned, nothing would be left undone to merit a continuance of their patronage. He thanked them on behalf of his partner and self for the cordial manner in which they had received the toast.

Mr. Foley having been moved out of the Chair, he was thanked for his conduct in presiding over their festive meeting, and his health was drank amid the most enthusiastic cheering.

We must not conclude our report without making mention that the pleasures of the evening were greatly heightened by the singing of Messrs. Reeves, H. Thirkell, Lang, Douglas, Bell and Irvine, who favored the company with a number of choice songs.

The pleasant social party broke up at a seasonable hour, after singing "God Save the Queen," and giving several loud cheers for our much-loved Sovereign. So ended the memorable "Twelfth" in Lindsay.

Literary Notices.
THE SUNDAY MAGAZINE for July.—Strahan & Co., Limited, Hill, London.
This Magazine, which is edited by the celebrated Free Church Minister, Dr. Guthrie, is issued in weekly numbers at 1d. and in monthly parts at 7d. sterling, registered for transmission abroad. It contains a pleasing variety of moral and religious tales, didactic and expository articles, popular science, poetry, &c., &c., all of a respectable and some of a high order of merit. From a very readable article in its pages on "Milton's Cosmos," we take the following short extract:—

"When Milton was at Cambridge, he was nicknamed 'The Lady.' The sobriquet did not arise merely from the almost feminine beauty of his face, the delicate complexion of white and red, and the rich amber locks, so often 'the cynosure of wondering eyes.'—It had at least much to do with the singular purity of his character, and his most careful and constant abstinence from the recreations of the time. From his earliest years he had an intense delight in purity, and the passion for it was nothing less—rather and impelled him as really and powerfully as the opposite vice sways so many young men. A more true or complete man than Milton there never was; nor could we desire a more thorough refutation than his case supplied of the infamous position, that there is any true connection between manliness and sensual passion. This purity of soul derived strength from very pride and ambition of his nature; for with him it was a kind of intuitive belief that whoever would write well in fable and things ought himself to be a true poem; that is, a composition and pattern of the best and lovablest things; not presuming to sing high praises of heroic men or famous cities, unless he have in himself the experience and the practice of all that which is praiseworthy."

Teachers' Meeting.
LINDSAY, July 8th, 1865.
The Teachers' meeting, as announced, was held in the Grammar School House. George Young, Esq., B.A., was elected chairman.

Mr. M. O'Neill was appointed Secretary. The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

The chairman explained the subjects to be brought under consideration at the present meeting.

Moved by John McSwaine, seconded by Henry Fowler.—That we postpone the appointing of a delegate to the Toronto convention in Mr. Young's place, to a future meeting.—Carried.

Moved by W. D. Stacey, seconded by J. McSwaine.—That the following draft of a constitution handed in by Mr. Young be considered *seriatim* in committee of the whole.—Carried.

After discussion on motion of Mr. Fowler seconded by J. Russell, the constitution as amended was adopted, and is as follows:

Article 1st.—This Association shall be known as the "Teacher's Association for the County of Victoria," and shall be composed of those Teachers, school officers, and friends of education who shall conform to this constitution and the by-laws for which it provides.

Article 2nd.—The object of this Association shall be the mutual improvement of its

members, by lectures, essays, and discussions on the various topics connected with the educational interests of our county, and also the practical illustration of the best methods of imparting instruction.

Article 3rd.—The officers of this Association shall consist of a President, two Vice Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and a committee of nine, who together shall form an executive board, to be elected annually at the end of the session, five of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article 4th.—It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the regular meetings of the association, in his absence, the Vice Presidents in order of seniority, and in the event of their absence, the Board shall appoint a chairman pro tem.

Article 5th.—The duties of the Treasurer shall be to take charge of all monies belonging to the Association and hold such subject to the order of the Board signed by the President, and report the state of the funds when required by the Board or Association.

Article 6th.—The duties of the Secretary shall be to keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association, conduct the correspondence, and discharge such other duties pertaining to his office as may be required of him.

Article 7th.—The duties of the Executive Board shall be to make all necessary arrangements for the meetings of the Association, to procure lecturers, to attend to the general business not otherwise provided for, and to recommend for approval such by-laws as may be deemed necessary for the government of the Association.

Article 8th.—This Association shall hold its annual meeting during the holidays in the month of August, the day of opening to be fixed at the previous meeting.

Moved by Mr. Stacey, seconded by Mr. Russell.—That the first Teachers' Convention be held in the Grammar school, Lindsay, on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, the 8th, 9th, 10th and 11th days of August next, commencing each day at 9 o'clock A.M.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Whalley seconded by Mr. J. J. Brown.—That in order to facilitate the business of the convention the following programme of subjects to be discussed, and teachers are hereby requested to come prepared to take part in the business of the convention.—Carried.

Enthusiastic Reception of Mr. McGee in Montreal.

On the arrival of Mr. McGee, he was met at the station by a number of his friends who conducted him to his house in Montmorency Place. The following address was then presented to him by the hands of Mr. Thomas McKenna:—

"Hon. Sir,—We, the undersigned, your fellow-countymen and constituents greet you on your return from the land of your birth, with a hearty 'Cead meilla faill'."

"We do so the more joyfully because of your efforts to secure for Canada the advantage of a larger and healthier immigration, and our appreciation of the firm and untiring course pursued by you in ennobling on all occasions, and especially in your native country, and in the town of Wexford, a plain and truthful statement of the position of your countrymen on this side of the Atlantic."

"In conclusion, Hon. Sir, we beg to convey to you the assurance of our unshaken confidence in you as our true and faithful representative, with the hope that the Almighty may be pleased to lengthen your days for the general benefit of this adopted country, and of humanity at large."

The address was signed by about fifty of Mr. McGee's best known and most influential supporters.

Mr. McGee returned a reply, and in allusion to his Wexford address, said he had thought a little plain speaking was never more needed in Ireland. He found his countrymen full of false notions. Their friends that wrote to them from Boston and New York, conceived the disagreeable portions of the life of Irish emigrant, and only gave the fairer side. In this way an idea had come to exist in their imaginations which was not borne out by facts. Those who had criticized his speech most keenly had least about the matter; for himself, he had had 17 years experience, and was able to find himself once more under his own roof, that he did not wish to think of anything controversial.
