THE PHOENIX PARK ASSASSINS

Startling Evidence Presented. James Cary, member of the corporation of Dublin, Brady O'Brien, McCaffery, Peter Cary, Hanlon, Doyle and Kelly were on Saturday morning tried on a charge of murdering Lord F. Cavendish and Mr. Burke. There was great excitement in court when the prisoners were placed in the dock. They shook hands with each other and joken, nodding to their friends, and the reading of the charge was greeted by the prisoners with a burst of loud laughter, which created a painful sensation in court. There was a painful pause when firstmmons, the wirness was called. He identified Councillor Cary as connected with the conspiracy. Firstimmons deposed that he rented a room from James Cary. He discovered in the loft of the house among a discovered in the loft of the house among a quantity of rubbish two knives and a rifle. Amid intense excitement the losp ctor produced two sharp long-bladed dissecting knives and a rifle. The magistrates eagerly examined the knives. Some unea-iness was noticed among the prisoners. Fitz-immone also deposed that James Cary sometimes visited the loft where the knives were found. The magistrates ruled the identification of Peter Cary by Fitzsimnone to be complete.

THE PRISONERS INTERESTED. Dr. Porter deposed that the cuts in the clothes and the wounds of Lord Frenerick Cavendish and Mr. Burke were inflicted by instruments similar to those produced. He added that some of the wounds might have been caused by weapons different from the knives. The evidence of this witness was followed with extraordinary interest. The prisoners leaned over the dock, apparently drinking in every word. Porter said the wound that transfixe! Mr. Burke's heart enabled him to judge the length of the weapon, which must have been nine or ten inches. Dr. Myles deposed that some of the wounds of Cavendish and Burke corresponded exactly to the maives pro-

IDENTIFYING THE MURDERERS wirness named Hands identified O'Brien as one of the four men lying near O'Frien as one of the four men lying near the scene of the murder, and Brady as being close by shortly before it was perpetrated. Hands also identified Brady as the driver of the car on which the assassing rode. Upon his identifying O'Brien the latter attempted to smile, but broke into a profuse prespiration. A female witness also identified O'Brien and Brady as being near the scene of the murder. After another witness had identified Brady and Mc. Caffrey as being at the scene immediately before the murder, the case was remanded until Monday.

Some months ago the head of the criminal investigation department organized a system of explonage similar to the method adopted in Pennsylvania in bringing the Molly Magnires to justice. In connection therewith, Jenkinson, director of the department, visited London a fortnight ago and conferred with Sir. Wm. Harcourt, secretary of the home department. As a result the men in a public station have been more vigilantly guarded, especially the Marquie of Harrington and Sir Wm. Harcourt. OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, Feb. 9, 1883. Business and Produce.

The delivery of grain while active during the week has been hindered by the heavily drifted snow. Farmers near the town who have wheat to sell are pringing in a large quantity and the sample is very fuir. Prices have advanced a trifle and are now quoted at: Fall, 92c. to 94c.; spring. 93: to 96.; Arnecta, 85c. to 87c. Barley and other grains have not changed, and produce stonds at last week's prices. British Grain Trade.

The Mark Lane Express of Monday, in a review of the British grain trade during the past week says, that owing to the scarcity of sound, dry samples, native wheat is dearer, most provincial markets showing an advance of a shilling. The prices of flour are firmly maintained, despite the small demand. Barley has advanced, and others are unchanged. The trade in foreign wheat is very backward. and the trade in flour was slow, out values are steady notwithstanding the unprecedented amount on passage and on spot. TAXES! TAXES The supply of maize is very small, and prices are a very litle higher. Oats are dull and weaker, and other articles are unchanged. Cargoes off the coast are stronger and in active demand. There were tificen fresh arrivals and nine sales. I welve were withdrawn and four remain. About 24 cargoes are due this week. The sales of English wheat during the week were 59,901 quarters at 40s 6d per quarter, against 50,080 quarters at 45s 1d for the corresponding period of last year. Montreal Live Stock Market.
