Two or three dozen property holders, as many ratepayers, and a number of hoys went to see the show, and were somewhat disappointed. Mayor Wallace occupied the chair with his usual dignity and good somewhat disappointed. Mayor Wallace occupied the chair with his usual dignity and good humor. He invited several prominent residents to the platform and called on them to speak.... Col. Deacon gave an interesting historical sketch of the railways doings of the town during the last ten or fifteen years and read the report printed in THE Post last week on railway rates... Squire McDonnell gave a resume of the speeches of Geo. Laidlaw, Hon. S. C. Wood, Hon. Oliver Mowat, Hon. Messrs. Fraser, Hardy, Pardee and others, as reported in THE Post, arguing therefrom that Mr. Laidlaw had promised to build the railway to the Mattawan and that the premier and his colleagues had endorsed the promises. They were therefore bound to hand us back a considerable part of the \$85,000 bonus paid to the Victoria railway. Mr. McDonnell remarked in passing that the people of Lindsay were under a debt of grafffude to THE Post for its full report of the speeches made by the hon. gentleman named, and which he considered very valuable.... J. McIntyre, M.P.P., our representative in the Ontario legislature, to use his influence in the said legislature and also with the government of Ontario to obtain from them fair compensation to the ratepayers of Lindsay for the serious loss sustained by them by reason of the non-completion of the said road... It was suggested that the name of Mr. Dundas, M.P., should be added with the view of bringing the matter before the house of commons, but Mr. Dundas declared that that would only be making a farce of the matter and the mayor dropped the proposed amendment. Col. Deacon gave another sketch of the railway history of the town. The resolution was put and carried and the meeting closed.
