CHEESE FACTORY.—A very successful meeting of the patrons of the Star cheese factory was held in the factory on the evening of Nov. 30th, when, after partaking of a sumptuous repast provided by the ladies, in which they excel, the business of the evening was commenced. It was shown by the secretary and treasurer, Messrs. J. Liffing and R. Kennedy, that there had been delivered at the factory 307,128 lbs. of cheese, for which the patrons realized the handsome sum of \$6,084.44; and that it had required an average of 14 lbs. of milk to make one pound of cheese. Then followed speeches from Messrs. C. Fairbairn, J. Junkin, W. Thurn, W. Ker, W. Hunter, P. Meenan, T. Robertson and P. Murdoch on the benefits of cheese making. As the close of the meeting the cheese-maker, Miss Letitia Hunter, was presented with a handsome silver watch; and her assistant, Mrs. Wm. Kennedy, with a very handsome family bible, by Mr. Robert Kennedy on behalf of the patrons of the factory for the very satisfactory manner in which they had conducted the business of the factory for the past season. The duties of chairman were performed by Mr. John Hunter to the entire satisfaction of all.
