IMPORTANT DIVISION COURT CASE. -The following judgment was given by Judge Dartnell at last meeting of the division court held here. The case is a very important one and should be a warning to Action brought to recover \$10, balance du on a promissory note. The plaintiff eagent, one Glendenning, living at the village of Sunderland, wrote a letter to the defendant, on behalf of the plaintiff the sum of \$59.10, adding the words, "you can remit the \$59 by registered letter and I will return you the note by next mail." The defendant swore that he took bills of the denomination of one \$20, three \$10s, and two \$5s, to one Westcott, a store-keeper in Beaverton, who at his request changed one of the fives and enclosed the twenty, the three tens, one five, one two and two ones in an envelope, with Glandenning's own letter. That Westcott sealed it with adhesive gum, that Westcott's clerk directed it without knowing its contents, that Westcott then sealed it with scaling wax, using as a seal the impression of a brass cartridge shell, handed it to the defendant, who took it to the post office, registered it and posted it. The envelope was produced in court; it had been opened at one end and neither the send or the envelope itself had the slightest appearance of being tampered with. Glendenning swore that he received

and opened the letter in his own house: that his wife was present and her attention was called to the occurrence by her husband's remark "that it was a strange thing to return a man's own letter without a line accompanying it." That they both counted the money enclosed carefully, and there was only \$19, there being but two \$10s instead of three. Glendinning's wife gave the same testimony, and said she and her hu shand made careful and immediate search. Judge Darrnell: Although the amount in dispute is small the principle underlying the lines of myjudgment is of much practical im-portance and I have been asked a written judgment. The character of the witnesses on both sides was not impeached and I on both sides was not impeached and I have every reason to believe is unimpeachable; my judgment must therefore be given on other grounds than the weight of testimony, on the amount of crederce to be given to the witnesses on one side or the other. The cases seem to show that where a creditor directs his debtor to remit in a particular was and the moray in lost in particular way and the money is lost in transmission, the lose must fall upon the creditor. - Greenleaf on Evidence, vol. page 525, and the cases there cited. I think all that Glendenning assumed was the risk of the loss while in course of transmis-

sion; if the letter had been lost, stolen, burnt or destroyed during its journey I have no doubt the defendant must have succeedno doubt the defendant must have succeeded on the evidence adduced by him. But this is not the case in this suit, unless I disbelieve Glendenning and his wife who say the sum was short \$10 on the letter being opened—I have no reason to disbelieve them. The onus of proving payment is on the defendant. With every confidence in his honesty and that of his witnesses I think it much more likely that the mistake amose at Beaverton, although the defendant awars that the money was mistake arose at Beaverton, although it e defendant swears that the money was counted after the charge was made. 
