The work of the public schools was reviewed and thoroughly criticized, and many excellent suggestions made which the board were asked the advisability of putting in practice The two reports were received and adopted.

TIGHTENING THE PURSESTRINGS. Col. DEACON placed on the table a moboard should expend money either for new material, supplies or repairs to a larger sum than \$5.00 without bringing such expenditure before the board for their sanction. The motion was adopted. INCREASING A STIPEND.

Mr. McNEILLIE referred to the application of Mr. Dunn for an increase of salary made some time ago, and said that the committee to whom the request had been referred recommended that \$100 be added to Mr. Dunn's salary, making it the same as his predecessor had received, \$900. Mr. Pilkie opposed making any increase. Mr. Walters said he would prefer encouraging the teachers in the public schools, where the best of teachers were needed at all times. The chairman, while admitting that it would be a great benefit if a good that it would be a great benefit if a good deal of the money now spent on the high schools could be expended on the public schools, said that the law was as it was and could not be altered. Col. Deacon pointed out that the lowest classes in the high school were practically the higher classes in the public schools, and that the public schools were largely benefitted by the services of high school teachers. the services of high school teachers. The motion for an increase was carried after which the board adjourned.
