A FORCIBLE RESOLUTION. The board of education met on Tuesday of last week in the council chamber. Present: Mr. W. Grace, chairman; and Mesers. Corneil, Hudepeth, Walters, McNeillie, Wray and Irwin. The secretary read the minutes of the April meeting which were anninged of.

I beg to report that I have to-day examined at all the schools with the following result:- East ward, boy's department: Accommodation hardly sufficient, fairly clean, smell offensive, urinary needs repairs door broken, platform out of place. Girl's department: Accommodation sufficient, walls, seat and floor clean, door off, latch broken. South ward-Boy's department: Accommodation sufficient, seat and floor very dirty, unlit to enter, walls disfigured, smell very offensive, latch broken. Girl's department: Accommodation sufficient, seat and floors clean, repairs needed to doors. Cambridgest: One department kept locked; floor dirty, seat fairly clean, smell very offensive, walls slightly disfigured. The other department not locked, floor dirty, door will not shut, smell offensive, walls slightly disfigured. North ward-Boy's departdirty, door will not shut, smell offensive, walls slightly disfigured. North word-Boy's department: Two seats broken, one door gone, two fastenings broken, one broken down, two floors dirty, one leor clean, one seat dirty, smell offensive, one seat clean, one seat dirty, wall disfigured. Girl's department: two compartments, one clean and ridy, the other the door is fastened and their is no admission. Union school-Rose clean and tidy, the other the door is factored and their is no admission. Union school—Boy's department: Accommodation sufficient, seats and floors clean, walls white wished. I would recommend that all the out-buildings be put in a proper state of repair and cleanlines, that they be white-washed, and that the carth closet system be adopted. ALCOHOL AND THE BEART. Dr. N. B. Richardson, of London, the noted physician, says he was recently able to convey a considerable amount of conviction to an intelligent scholar, by a simple experiment. The scholar was singing the praises of the "Ruddy Bumper," and saying he could not get through the day without it, when Dr. Richardson said to him:—
