NEIL'S COMPESSION.—Previous to his execution on Tuesday morning the unfortunate man Neil made a stariling confession to his spiritual adviser. Mesers. Howland and Gooderham. It is kept for the present by Governor Green from the public in order that the interests of justice may be more easily served, and in order that the detectives may more easily work on the information given in it. The confession discloses the facts of two marders which occurred within a stone's throw of each other in the mosths of March, 1886, and in May last. Neil has confessed as being a participant in the murder of George D. Morse, the well-known cattle dealer, in May last. The confession of Neil reveals the fact that Mr. Morse was attacked while walking along the Espianede, sand-bagged and stunned, and that he fell into the water. His murderers, being alarmed, were frightened off, and left him to drown in about eighteen inches of water without relieving their victim of his money or valuables. The other murder confessed by Neil is that of John Cochrane, an old street car driver. Cochrane was attacked on the night of the 18th of March, 1886, sand-bagged, robbed of his week's wages, amounting to \$8, and thrown off the E-planade into the water near the foot of Berkeley-at., where he was found drowned on the following morning. No marks of vicience were visible on his person, and the jury which sat upon the case returned a verdict of "Found drowned." It is to be hoped that the perpetrators of these terrible crimes will be speedily brought to justice, and that the confession of Neil is full and sufficient to accomplish that end. full and sufficient to accomplish that end.
