AN OVERDOSE OF AN OPIATE,—Charles F. Wilkes, a druggist of Beaverton, died at 43 Stewart-st. on Monday night under circumstances that warranted the holding of an inquest. He had been in business in Beaverton for some months, his wife remaining here, where he formerly lived, and being occasionally visited by her husband. Saturday morning Wilkes unexpectedly came to town, and joined his wife at 48 Stewart-st. On Monday morning he visited several wholesale drug stores making purchases and spent the afternoon with a friend, Mr. Fred Kennedy, whose house he promised to visit that night. Wilkes did not arrive at 48 Stewart-st. till 8 o'clock and his wife noticed that he was much depressed. He are nothing and sent his wife to Mr. Kennedy's house to say he could not keep the engagement. Mra. Wilkes went and brought Mr. Kennedy back with her, only to find her husband lying on the floor in a half-conscious condition and surrounded by the members of the household, who had been attracted by Wilkes grouning shortly after his wife went out. In an empty store was found a paper containing the remains of a white powder opiate. Dr. John Ogden of Bathurstet was summoned, but could do nothing and the unfortunate man died shortly after the doctor entered. At five o'clock Tuesday afternoon Coroner Dunesa held an inquest in the house. There was nothing in the evidence to show that Wilkes had suicided. Is was shown, however, that he was in the habit of taking opiates such as found in the room, and the jury decided that death resulted from an overdose of an opiate. Wilkes was 39 years of age and had been married six years; he leaves no children.—[World.]
