**MANUVERS CONSERVATIVE ASSOCIATION.**  
An annual meeting of the Manuvers Conservative Association was held in the town hall, Bethany, on Thursday afternoon, to take into consideration the vote of the member for East Durham, H. A. Ward, M.P., on the Jesuits' estates bill. A large delegation was present, every seat in the spacious hall being occupied. In the audience might have been seen nearly all the representative men of the township. The member for the riding, however, Mr. Ward, who had received notice of the meeting, was conspicuous by his absence. The chair was occupied by Mr. Thos. O'Brien, president of the association. On the platform were Mr. George McCartney, secretary, Squibb Touchburn, and others.

A stirring speech, condemning the action of the member, H. A. Ward, and the government of Sir John Macdonald was delivered by Dr. C. E. Brechin, ex-M.P. for East Durham; Capt. Preston, a lifelong conservative, also delivered a telling speech, and said he was perfectly in accord with the course pursued by the Mail newspaper on the Jesuit question, and contended that it was time the people of Ontario opened their eyes to the true state of affairs. Mr. J. J. Preston, deputy-reve of Manuvers and secretary of the East Durham Conservative Association, also delivered a strong address, saying that it had been stated by some parties that whoever spoke here condemning the government or representative would meet with political death. He said that for one he most emphatically condemned the action of Mr. Ward in voting against Col. O'Brien's motion, and that if it meant political death to him he intended to die. The following resolution was carried without a dissenting voice:—Moved by Mr. John Cairns, seconded by Mr. James Lytle, that the liberal conservative of not only the conservatives of the township, but also of the vast majority of his constituents, irrespective of their political proclivities, the meeting was then brought to a close by giving three cheers for the queen.—(Mail.)

**BRUTE HUMANITY.**  
Once in the city of Vienna there was a dread of hydrophobia, and orders were given to massacre all the dogs which were found unclaimed or uncollared in the city or suburbs. 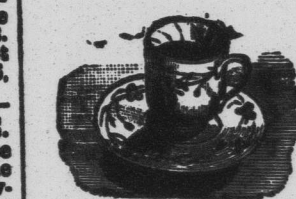

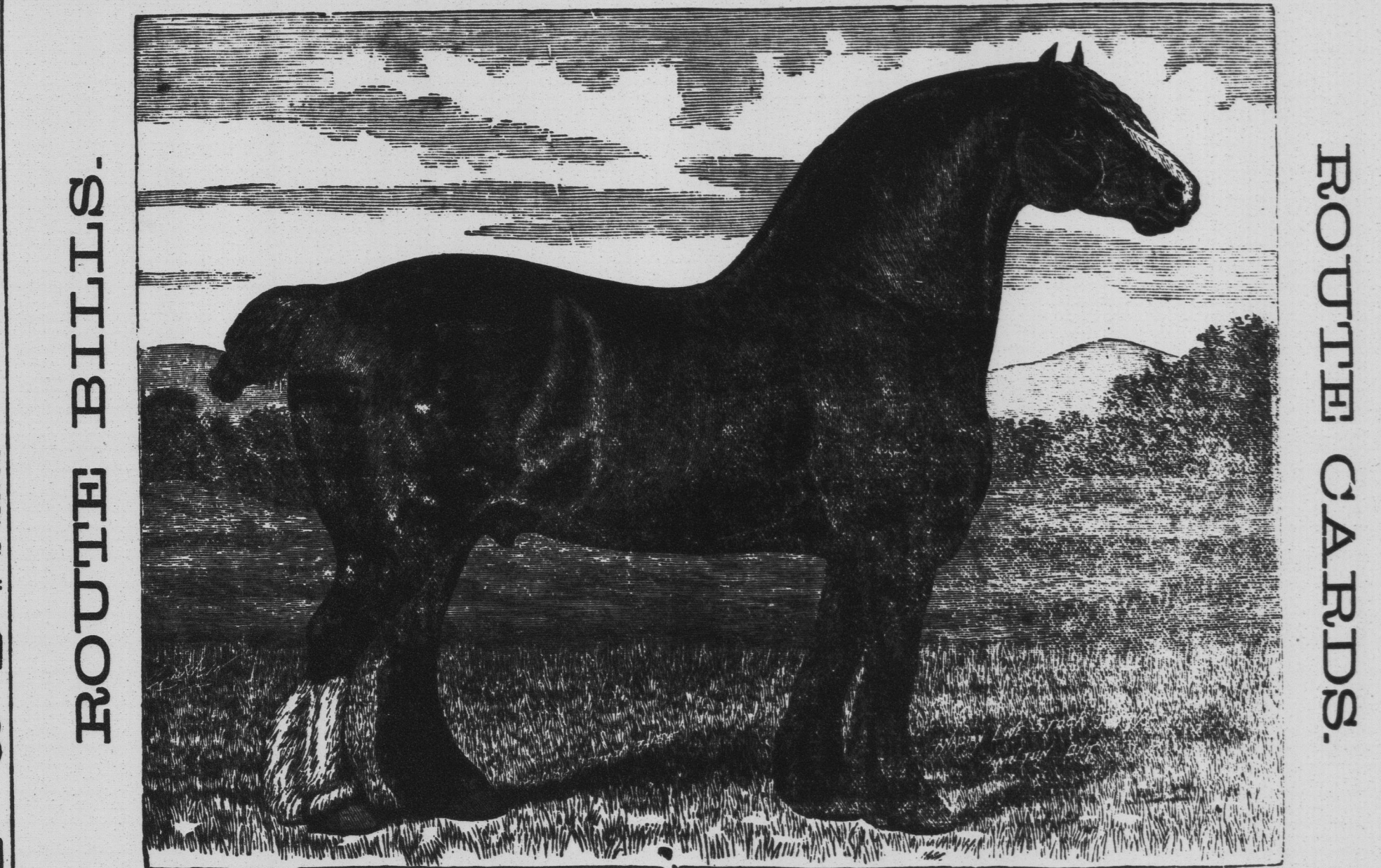
