Reports also show the storm did much damage to crops and farm buildings in the country for thirty miles about the city. The Pioneer Press has the following additional news from the Fargo storm. From the surrounding country, within a radius of thirty miles, reports of damage to the growing crops come in. In many places wheat was standing two or three feet high and heading out. Reports say it is badly looged and in some instances whipped and logged and in some instances whipped and toru to pieces or broken off, but in the majority of cases it will not suffer material injury. Farm houses, barns and outbuildings in all directions are reported levelled to the ground, and trees along the river banks for miles in both directions from the city, are broken off or shorn of foliage.
