tember, were granted by the defunct government 200 square miles of timber limits with the privilege of selecting in blocks of twenty square miles and having three years to locate and no mills to erect at all. Then in the Dominion Lands Act, Sir John, finding the twenty-one years lease plan not successful, adopted the yearly license system, whereby the right to cut was granted by tender or public auction to the highest bidder by bonus per square mile. The statute required mills to be erected of a capacity of 1,000 feet every twenty-four hours for each two and a half miles of limits, or else the lease was cancelled. Hon. Mr. White exposed the W. Ross in contrasting the timber policy of Ontario with the Dominion. The of Ontario with the Dominion. The Dominion government required a ground rent per mile with rent paid one month in advance, and royalty on all timber cut. Ontario simply exacted \$2 per mile with royalty on timber cut. The \$400 per square mile boasted of by Mr. Ross is simply one instance of bonus. A full statement of this has already appeared in statement of this has already appeared in these columns. Mr. White stated that though repeatedly challenged no one had yet produced a man, friend or opponent, who had got timber limits, grazing ranche or any other grant in any but the most regular way. No one could get these but in accordance with the strict letter of the regulations. As a practical result Mr. Mackenzie obtained only \$7,000 from timber limits and bonuses during his term of office, though many great results. term of office, though many grants were made, while under Sir John \$90,000 were gotten in bonuses, and in all \$547,000 have been realized.
