

On the contrary it vitiates public morality, inclining men to prevarication and deeds of violence, more dangerous to the public peace than the excesses for which it is sought to correct or remove. It is plain that all who voted for the act are not its supporters since it became

Under this specious plea what crimes and outrages have not bigots and fanatics, in all ages of the world, been enabled to commit upon the honest and unsuspecting of their fellow men, even in our own America? Cotton Mather was as learned, pious and well-meaning as "Temperance," whom he somewhat resembles, when he advised the authorities of Boston to hang some poor, decrepid old women as witches, and flay others at the tail of a cart, for other fancied immerulities; all of which he contended was for the public good. If a New England divine, reared in the land of liberty, who took in the Westminster Confession of Faith with his mother's milk, would do such a thing, what mischief might not be expected if such a man as "Temperance," learned though he be, if he could stand behind a magistrate and secretly advise him in the execution of a law, that would give full vent to his arbitrary and vindictive intelerance?
