**Prima Facie School Supporters.**

The change effected by Mr. Mowat, making Roman Catholic ratepayers prima facie school supporters instead of being prima facie public school supporters, is considered an objectionable by the people of Ontario that great efforts are being made to delude the electors as to the position of this question. One of the Mowatite organs says:—

"If such written notice has not been given to the ratepayer, his prima facie classification by the assessor amounts to nothing."

It is notorious to this—that he is classed prima facie as a separate school supporter because he is a Roman Catholic, and this prima facie assumption has to be rebutted to remove him from the separate school list and place him on the public school. The Mowatites may think this absolute reversal to the position of Confederation "amounts to nothing," but the electors think it amounts to enough to show Mr. Mowat to be a traitor to the Premier and they intend to say so at the polls.

The practice of assuming Roman Catholic ratepayers to be separate school supporters is so unfavorable on the part of the assessor, that Mr. Mowat's friends have never been able to cite a single municipality as an exception. The judges invited by Mr. Mowat to explain to him the meaning of his law having decided that the assessor is justified in this prima facie classification by the following provision:—

"The assessor shall accept the statement of, or made on behalf of, any ratepayer that he is a Roman Catholic as sufficient prima facie evidence for placing such person in the proper column of the assessment roll for separate school supporters, or if the assessor knows personally any ratepayer to be a Roman Catholic this shall also be sufficient for placing him in such last mentioned column."

The plain instruction to the assessor is obstinately retained upon the statute book by Mr. Mowat that the practice may remain of classing Roman Catholic ratepayers as separate school supporters. It is altogether beside the question to place that the law allows the elector to rebuttal of this prima facie evidence and classification. The point is that Mr. Mowat has reversed the prima facie position of Roman Catholics at Confederation as regards the schools. Roman Catholics and Protestants have alike complained of that change. Mr. Mowat will not yield, so on June 1st the electors will apply the other remedy.

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books shall be used as shall be authorized by regulation of the Department of Education, that such instruction shall be confined to reading, grammar and composition, and that no given copy of these books shall be given to any pupil whose parents or guardians shall request it.

8. If it shall appear by the report of the inspector that the provisions of this Act are not being in good faith carried out in any school, the provisions of section 7 shall, after notice has been given to the trustees of the school of such report, and failure by them for one month to remedy what is reported against, cease to apply to such school.

9. All regulations of the Department of Education inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby abrogated and repealed.

This measure met every feature of the case and would have remedied the defect in the public school system as the Ross method cannot possibly hope to do. Yet it was voted down by the Government.—*Empire.*

**Ten Good Things to Know**

1. That salt will curdle new milk, hence in preparing milk porridge, gruel, etc., the salt should not be added until the milk is prepared.
2. That clean boiling water will remove tea stains and many fruit stains. Pour the water through the stain and thus prevent its spreading over the fabric.
3. That ripe tomatoes will remove ink and other stains from white cloth, also from the hands.
4. That a tablespoonful of turpentine bottled with white clothes will aid in the whitening process.
5. That boiled starch is much improved by the addition of a little sperm, salt or gum arabic dissolved.
6. That beeswax and salt will make rusty fat irons as clean and smooth as glass. The wax of wax is a rag, keep it for that purpose. When the iron is hot, rub them first with the wax rag, then scour with paper or cloth sprinkled with salt.
7. That blue ointment and kerosene mixed in equal proportions and applied to the bedsteads is as an unfailing bedding remedy, as a host.
8. That kerosene will soften boots or shoes that have been hardened by water, and render them as pliable as new.
9. That kerosene will make a tin tea kettle as bright as new. Saturate a woolen rag and rub with it. It will also remove stains from varnished furniture.
10. That cool rain water and soda will remove machine grease from washable fabrics.—*The Dominion Agriculturist.*

**Kindness in the Dairy.**

It is a fact that a cow with generous feeding and good care, but with cross and unkind treatment, will not yield as great a profit as she will with kind treatment. A good dairy cow is extremely sensitive and responsive to kindness and abuse. It is plain that when the milker approaches a cow and she gazes at him with eyes filled with fear and trembling, and gathers herself together to receive an expected blow, she is not going to yield as great an amount of milk, or as rich in quality, as she would if her eyes gave him a glad welcome. Kindness begets kindness, and the cows that are kindly treated, are the very best when kindly treated. There is occasionally one that is naturally vicious, and it is a waste of time and patience to try and change their nature. Sell her to the butcher and end her vicious existence. It is a very easy matter to have a herd of dairy cattle that are kindly disposed to each other and to those who have the care of them. If you happen to hire a man whom the cattle fear or dislike, don't keep him, even if he would work for his board, for you would lose money by it. The first consideration in hiring a man on the dairy farm is that he is kind and gentle to animals. When we hire a man we know that if the cattle don't like him he must get. We have a young man once who proved naturally vicious; he stayed nearly a week, did not openly break any rules, but all the cattle in the section of the barn where he worked disliked and feared him, and some of the most gentle ones would not let him tie or untie them; and those he fed but did not
