OTTAWA, February 3.—The reason for the Government's speed to the country is contained in the following letter from Lord Stanley, the Governor-General, to the Secretary of State for the Colonies. It contains the details of Sir John's proposal to the United States, and points directly to the earnest endeavor of the Government to enlarge the trade relations between Canada and the great Ramblic.

My LORD, -I have the honor to send to propose a joint commission such as that of 1871 with authority to deal without limitation and to prepare a treaty respecting the following subjects:
