ONE OF TORONTO'S PROMINENT CITIZENS PASSES AWAY.—James B. Bickell died very suddenly of heart failure at the Homopathic hospital Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The deceased was born in the parish of Stowford Devonshire, Eng., December 7, 1820. He came to this country when about 17 years of age, and settled in the vicinity of Peterboro. He afterwards moved to Bowmanville, and later to Brookville, where for many years he was engaged in the mining business. He was one of the most prominent Conservatives in that district, and for about twenty years was reeve of the township of Whitby. He was also warden of the county for several years. In 1881 he removed to Toronto and entered into partnership with ex-Ald. Samuel B. Wickett in conducting an extensive hatter and leather manufactory. For a number of years Mr. Bickell suffered from dyspepsia, and on Wednesday he went to the Homopathic hospital to undergo a treatment. He had been down to business that morning and was apparently in very fair health. Friday afternoon about 3 o'clock the nurse spoke to him, but he appeared to be partly unconscious and was unable to reply. Restoratives were applied, but he passed away almost immediately. The family live at 373 Seckeville street and now consist of a widow and six children, three sons and three daughters. Mr. Bickell was a member of the Masonic order and at one time was an officer of the grand lodge. He was also a member of the Sons of England and several other societies. The funeral took place on Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock, when the remains were taken to Bowmanville for interment. Mr. W. Bickell of Mariposa was a brother of the deceased.
