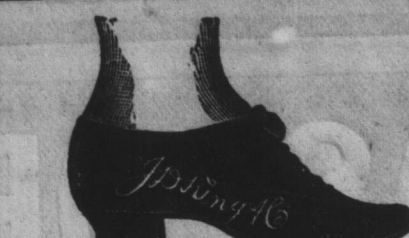
URBAN AND SUBURBAN.

building a stop log dam. Mr. Walters

had four detonating caps for exploding

dynamite, three of which he used, placing the

fourth in his vest pocket. After dinner,

while feeling in his vest pocket for a match to

light his pipe, the detonator exploded, blow-

ing off the first finger of the right hand, be-

side injury to the thumb and middle finger.

The force of the explosion was outward,

otherwise the accident might have been more

serious. The wounds were dressed by Dr.

Tynges at Magallowan. Mr. Walters coming

home on Saturday evening. The cause of the

explosion is supposed to be that the end of a

match scratched the cap.
