The County Councils Act, 1896.

Division of the County of
Victoria.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS.

To His Honor the Lieutenant Governor in
Council:

WE, the undersigned Commissioners ap-
pointed under "The County Councils Act,
1896" by the Lieutenant Governor in Council,
to divide the County of Victoria into County
Council Divisions, report, that having duly
heard and considered all the evidence ad-
duced before us, and having had due regard to
the provisions of the said Act, we have
divided the said County into Six County
Council Divisions for the purposes of the said
Act, as follows:

1. The First County Council Division to
consist of the Township of Mariposa.

2. The Second County Council Division to
consist of the Township of Fenelon and
Sub-divisions numbers One and Two of the
Township of Ops, comprising all that part of
the said Township lying west of the Sengou
River.

3. The Third County Council Division to
consist of the Township of Eildon, Garden
and Dalton and the Village of Woodville.

4. The Fourth County Council Division to
consist of the Townships of Verulam and
Somerville and the Village of Bobcaygeon.

5. The Fifth County Council Division to
consist of the Townships of Fenelon, Bexley,
Laxton, Digby and Longford and the Village
of Fenelon Falls.

6. The Sixth County Council Division to
consist of the Townships of Eildon, Garden
and Dalton and the Village of Woodville.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

PATRIOTISM.—It is pleasing to note that
the first of July was patriotically and loyally
observed by the Canadians in Chicago. Re-
ports from Chicago say that between six and
eight thousand Canadians holidayed together
in observance of the day. Speeches highly
flavored with allusion to the Maple Leaf and
old England were the order of the day and
many were the fond memories recalled con-
cerning the scenes of childhood. The very
fact that Canadians abroad are still loyal to
the Dominion and that in the very midst of
Yankeeism they are not ashamed to show it,
speaks well for the national honor and fame
of our fair Canada.

GATHERING OF CANADIANS.—The Sons of
Scotland, Dundalk camp No. 149, Sebright,
will hold their second annual picnic on the
shore of Montgomery's lake, Sebright, on
Friday, July 26th. Several other lodges will
be in attendance. Speeches, sports, dancing,
and other features will be the order of the day.
No pains will be spared to give a most
enjoyable time.

Alleged Treasonable Conspiracy.

Canadian Inde-
pendence Club
Formed in
Montreal.

A FRENCH REPUBLIC ON THE
BANKS OF THE ST. LAW-
RENCE PROJECTED.

Some Remarkable Utter-
ances by a French Cana-
dian Paper.

Sir Charles Tupper Denoun-
ced as the Emissary of
Great Britain to Crush the
French Canadians—The
Recent Purchase of Rifles
Objected To.

The above are the headings of an article in
the Montreal Star of Wednesday, July 15th,
1896. The Star is regarded in many respects
as the first journal in Canada. It certainly
has much the largest circulation. The follow-
ing is the article under the above headings
and will partly illustrate the methods adopted
in Quebec for the success of the Laurier-Tupper
Cartwright combination. The article is entitled
the Star "mean" for republishing these.

The Toronto Mail and Empire published
the following paragraph in its Montreal
correspondence:

SEPARATION FROM ENGLAND.

"It has leaked out that there is within the
liberal ranks a secret organization, the
mission of which is the complete separation
of the Dominion from England and the
independence of Canada. This organization
worked secretly during the recent
campaign. Thousands of copies of a circular
favoring the establishment of a Canadian
republic were distributed over the province
of Quebec. The Patrie and other journals
daily published articles attacking England
and British institutions, and holding up Sir
Charles as the emissary of Great Britain to
crush the French-Canadians. The association
is still actively at work. The Patrie to-night
says: 'The Canadian independence club,
established a few months ago in Montreal, is
working incessantly. The object of the club
is to carry into execution Mr. Laurier's idea of
a French republic on the banks of the St.
Lawrence. The work of this club should
be the severance of the ties which bind us to
England and to protect the interests of
Mr. Laurier's Quebec followers, who now
claim to be masters of the administration.'"

Since the publication of the above despatch,
much anxiety has been expressed to know
what La Patrie's utterances were. At the risk
of offending some of our French contemporaries
who do not like to see reproduced in
English their articles prepared for the
delocation of a certain section of French
readers only, we make the liberty of publishing
the following interesting paragraphs culled
from the columns of La Patrie during the
recent electoral campaign:

(La Patrie, May 2nd.)

"CHAMBERLAIN PLEASED."

"Everybody is aware that Mr. Cham-
berlain, who appears of late to be the whole
English government, has sent a telegram to
Sir Charles Tupper, congratulating him on
having been made prime minister.

"We, the Chamberlains, are right to be pleased,
for Sir Charles is his creature, his factotum,
and it is he who has had our government
purchase, for a million and a half, old guns
that Chamberlain's factory had on its hands
to sell, and, to protect the interests of
England. Not the interests of Canada mark
well.

"Sir Charles has a mission to 'push'
'imperialism' in Canada, the policy of festi-
onism, etc., all on England's account.

"Now, do you understand why Chamberlain
is glad that Sir Charles has become prime
minister?"

"INDEPENDENCE."

"A certain number of French and English
citizens met yesterday to lay the foundation
of a Canadian independence club in Montreal.
Their aim is to work towards the realiza-
tion of the great and beautiful dream of a
Canadian republic.

"The work of organization will be com-
menced at once, and the work of the
propaganda will be taken up after the
elections."

"Canada First," is the policy of all those
who have at heart the interest of our country;
but it is not the policy of Sir Charles Tupper.

(La Patrie, May 5.)

"THE FAST SERVICE."

"For this service Canada will pay the
company, which shall have the contract,
\$750,000 a year; England, \$375,000.

"Is that not a great deal to make Canada
pay for a thing which, after all, is only
destined to protect English interests?"

"How can it profit the farmers to allow
\$750,000 to be squandered, so that rich men
and others may travel on faster steamers,
when they wish to plunge themselves for a
while into the London fog?"

"Tupper wants to work for England;
Laurier for Canada."

(La Patrie, May 6th.)

"IMPERIALISM."

"The manifesto of Sir Charles Tupper
smacks strongly of imperialism; it is the last
service, which is going to cost us \$750,000 a
year; it is the policy of guns and fortifications,
which is going to cost us \$3,000,000; it is also

the trans-Pacific cable, which is going to cost
us millions, etc.

"But where is Canada's immediate interest
in all that?"

"England has enormous interests in binding
Canada and Australia by means of a cable, in
furnishing our frontiers and our military ports
with fortifications, in having fast steamers
between Quebec and Liverpool. In the event
of war with other nations England will find
that very convenient and very useful."

"But, in fine, that will not benefit
agriculture; that will not give a market for
agricultural products; that will not arrest the
plague of emigration; that will not help our
provinces of Quebec; that will not put us in a
better position."

"Let us have good sense and intelligent
patriotism. Let us work for Canada and for
the well being of her population before
sacrificing our efforts and our millions for the
love of England."

"Sir Charles Tupper is a partisan of
imperial federation, and he hopes to lull the
vigilant to sleep with his deceitful projects."

"French Canadians, let us be on our guard."
(La Patrie, May 7th.)

"Is there a man of sense who can say that
Sir Charles Tupper is not, at this moment,
working for England?"

"Is there a man of sense who can assert
that the people ask for guns and for
fortifications?"

"Did the Venezuelan imbroglio concern us
in any way? Not the least in the world;
nevertheless, we borrow three millions; we
spend; we offend the Americans, who are our
neighbors and our friends, all because that
pleases Chamberlain and because old Tupper
knows that that will tickle the 'loyalty' of the
torches of Ontario and the weak-kneed."

"And then those things consolidate
England in her colonies."

"We are here on the banks of the St.
Lawrence and of the great lakes, a population
essentially agricultural. What do we want
with trans-Pacific cables when we are without
so many things that are useful and
indispensable?"

"While the government is spending
millions on the purchase of guns, hundreds of
Canadians die each day of the plague of
emigration. On the contrary."

(La Patrie, May 8th.)

"REPRISALS."

"While we are buying ourselves buying up
Chamberlain's old rifles, while we are drawing
of batteries and while England
is making us play the part of swash bucklers
for the benefit of the Americans, the press of
the United States is calling upon Cleveland
and congress to treat us more harshly."

(Here quotes N. Y. Sun.)

"That is what we gain by our gun policy."

"CANADIAN INDEPENDENCE."

"The other day we announced the forma-
tion of an 'Independence Club' in Montreal.
The Tribune, of Woonsocket, R.I., has
received this good news with the following
remarks:

"So much the better. . . . Canadians
should break, as soon as possible, the ties
which bind them to England, etc."

(La Patrie, May 9.)

"CHAMBERLAIN, FREE TRADER IN ENGLAND,"

would pass for protectionist in Canada, and
he uses Old Tupper to play his game. The
golden dream of the great man is to export
England to the detriment of her colonies, and,
to attain that end, he would ruin us, if
necessary, without scruple.

"What need have we of following an
aggressive policy against the United States,
where we, in the province of Quebec, have
a million of our own people who live and earn
their bread under the stars and stripes? En-
gland does not love the American republic,
because of its commercial competition; but
Canada has not to buy herself with England's
pleasure, in her progress towards moral and
material development."

(La Patrie, May 19th.)

"IMPERIALISM."

"Even Mr. Tupper prescribes 'imperialism.'
Yesterday he wished to make the farmers of
Vercheres-Chambly believe that the fast
service and the trans-Pacific cable would
make the fortune of the country."

"That farmers understand a fast service, a
trans-Pacific cable, that will cost us millions,
but something else is wanted for the prosperity
of Canada."

(La Patrie, May 25th.)

THE QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY.

"To-day, throughout the British Empire,
the birthday is being celebrated of the Queen,
whose reign has lasted nearly sixty years.

"Victoria should be pleased with the
Canadians, who have just bought guns for a
million and a half, who have established a
fast service for the purpose of, when
necessary, transporting troops from England;
who wish to construct a trans-Pacific cable,
and who another themselves in professions of
loyalty and in diplomatic grovelling, for the
greater glory of Great Britain."

"If Victoria does not find the aspirations of
the Canadians English enough, what must
they do?"

"All the same we have done so much for
England that we should now devote ourselves
a little less to her and a little more to Canada."

"The 'loyalists,' perhaps, will not find that
to their taste; but we shall only have to laugh
at them."

"On this day of imperial celebration we
cry out loudly: 'Long live Canada
for the Canadians!'"
