

Enoch Thompson, in an article in the November Arens, says that although the amount of cultivated land in Canada increased from less than 2s, 000,000 acres in 1881 to over 28 500,000 in 1891, still the number of people employed in the sultivation thereof decreased from 656,712 to 649 506.

This statement is sourcely correct. Mr. Thompson, in giving his figures, has included only farmers and farmers sons. He has excluded farm laborers altogether.

The total number of people engaged in agriculture, according to the D-minion census, was 632,630 in 1881 and 735,207 in 1891. This shows an actual increase in the whole numbered amployed.

It would not be suprising, however, if a

decrease had taken place during the last dycade, because great progress was then being made in the introduction of labor saying machinery, while farming was still carried on machinery, while farming was still daried on upon the old lines of grain production. Of late development has commenced along different lines. Fruit raising, tobacco culture and the production of bacon have become important industries, and dairying has grown in importance. The tendency of these industries is to increase the number of people

upon a given area.

The effect of the development of the fruit industry is surikingly shown in Lincoln and Wentworth counties. Take the township of Saliffet, the centre of the fruit district in the Saliff et, the centre of the fruit district in the latter county, as an example. The population of that township, according to the assessment returns, increased from 2 608 in 1892 to 2 919 in 1896. In the township of Nisgara, in the county of Lincols, again the population increasedfrom 1 636 in 1892 to 1 882 in 1896.

In addition to this, two rivers in Ontario go by the name of Sturgeon, and the name is also used in designating two places in Ontario known as Sturgeon Bay and Sturgeon Point.


