Canada for the British regular army. There are said to be certain advices from the War Office now on the way from England, and when they arrive the recruiting regulations will be issued in the form of a militia general order, and published in the Canada Gazette. The plan is to make the recruiting regulations applicable to every military district in Canada, and the order will empower dis trict commanding officers to have them duly carried out. The recruiting will be done eventually by non-commissioned officers and men of the permanent force in Canada, who will be sent out for the purpose to various points in their respective districts. A commencement, however, will probably be made with regular recruiting parties from the British army, as it is thought the enthusiasm of young Canadians will be most readily evoked by the sight of regular soldiers in all the gorgeous paneply of men marching to the tap of British drums.

This plan is no doubt the outcome of the movement to repatriate the 100th Royal Canadians, although recruits in Canada will be allowed the choice of any regiment to which to enlist. While those who have been patriotically active in promoting the scheme of repatriation are confident that the 100th can be brought up to full strength by Canadian recruits, many experienced military men predict failure of the scheme, believing that the glamour of military service in times of peace is not potent enough to induce young Canadians to enter the regular army at 25 cents a day.

Agriculture, in his last report says:
"The activity and extent of the demand for perichable food products de-pends very lurgely upon the excellence of the quality and relative highness or cheapness of price. I am informed by Powders. 1 powder 5c., 3 for 10s, 10 for 25c. retail merchants that when a family -76 5. ses fresh made creamery butter during the winter, the total quantity of butter onsumed is more than twice larger than when the same family purchased only a good quality of antumn made butter held over during the winter, as it used to be, in cellars and other unsuitable places. When Canadian creamery butter, Canadian turkeys, Canadian tender fruits and Canadian eggs are delivered in Great Britain through the use of cold storage conveniences in a perfectly preserved condition, the increased demand which tney will create for themselves will more than equal the capacity of the Canadian farmers to increase the production of these things. It is to be hoped also that by that means a large class of consumers of relatively high priced foods will prefer Canadian products to all others, and thus there will be returned to Canada a fair proportion of the price paid by the wealthy classes there for very dainty products. Then such preservation of the quality of products will lead to such increased production that there will be a very rapid and great extension of the export trade, As an instance of what has alrerdy resulted largely from the cold storage service, which was provided in even a primitive way on steamships for the season of 1895, it may be cited that the total exports of butter from Montreal during the season of navigation have been as follows: 1894, 32,055 packages; 1895, 65,

664 packages; 1896, 107,321 packages;

1897, 220,200 packages. "Another instance may be cited. In the autumn of 1897, a shipper of apples from Western Ontario divided a lot of 592 barrels into two shipments. The apples were reported to me to be of the same varieties, of the same sort and all packed in the same way at the same time. One shipment of 267 barrels was forwarded in cold storage; they were reported to be landed all in good condition and were sold at 18 slillings per barrel. The other part of the lot containing 325 barrels were sent without cold storage; 205 barrels of them were reported as landing in a slack or wet condition. The whole
