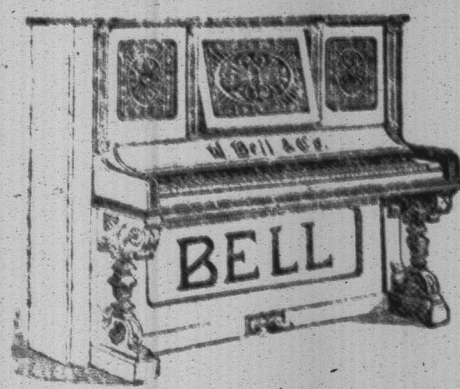

The poor girl's reputation on the coast was somewhat tarnished by her conduct while surrounded with poverty and loneliness in the coast music halls. The affair has created a big sensation on the coast.

LINDSAY'S NEW COUNCIL.

The Men who Will Govern the Town for 1899.

HOW THE VOTING WENT—THE BY LAWS ALL CARRY—COUNTY COUNCIL RETURNS

The best council Lindsay has ever had were the current voters in everyone's tongue after the results of the voting in the Municipal contest had been made known on Monday night. The men whose duty it will be to sustain the reputation of the popular verdict will be: Mayor—Thos. Walters, Aldermen—Ingle, Lennon, Jackson, Horn, Crandell and Sotharan.

No great excitement or enthusiasm was shown in the contest as has been the case before. There was, however, an unbroken feeling that a contest had been reached in Municipal matters and that now or never was the opportunity to elect a council that would guide the course of this rapidly growing town into proper channels. That feeling found a slight expression a few weeks ago when the town voted for reduced representatives in the council. Since then it has been gaining ground, thanks to the press and public spirited citizens, found voice on Monday when the town returned the sentiments mentioned. All the gentlemen were not our choice, but then as a matter of fact, we think with the majority of townpeople that there was little difference in the ability of most of the candidates. With the new year all hard feelings should be forgotten and THE WARDER wishes the new council every success for 1899, promising to back them up in every right endeavor to benefit the town and quite as ready to oppose them in every action which it thinks detrimental to the best interests of the citizens.

The Kitchener-Rider by-law also carried and the town has doubtless gained a new industry. Two councilors for hearty congratulation deserve special mention, the fact that the town declared its sympathy with the House of Refuge and that it voted for the free library. THE WARDER has always advocated a free library and it takes pleasure in heralding this new forward step of this progressive town. To Mr. E. A. Hardy, secretary of the public library, and to those gentlemen in the last council whose names do not occur to us at present, all of whom supported and whose action secured the vote on the library, we think the thanks of the town are due.

The Mayoralty contest developed some surprises. What action does not in the triangular fight between Walters, Kyle and Smyth so many and so varied. Mr. Walters' friends did their work quickly and well in the last few days while Mr. Kyle's defeat was a big surprise box to those who backed him. Perhaps the biggest surprise however was the poor showing made by Mr. Smyth. The general opinion seems to have been towards the close of the contest that Mr. Smyth would not be elected and that the election was between Walters and Kyle. The unlikelihood of electors to cast, as they thought, a leading vote, doubtless accounts for Mr. Smyth's small poll.

Of the old aldermen in this year's council there will be Messrs. Horn and Crandell. Mr. Horn deserves re-election. He has ever remained true to his principles, and while at times he advocated measures that were apparently against the popular opinion of his fellow councilmen—which was not always the best opinion—he had the stamina to stick to his colors. Mr. Horn should prove a very useful member of the new council. Capt. Crandell again sits in the new council. The Captain has been so long before the Lindsay public that he needs no introduction to it. His election on Monday was a recognition of his past services.

Of the new aldermen, Messrs. Ingle, Lennon and Sotharan have been in the council before. They are all hard headed, shrewd business men, and we believe that their election will bring ample returns to the town in the way of good government.

Mr. Jackson enters the municipal legislature for his first time. He is a conscientious man and the very essence of integrity. He made no special efforts to secure election, and his success was a tribute to his standing in the community, and must have been very gratifying to this public spirited citizen.
