



Medical Health Officer's Report.

The following is the yearly report of Dr. McAlpine, medical health officer, presented at the last meeting of the board of health:-During the year ending November 15th,

1896, the health of the residents of the town has been good and excepting an unusually large number of cases of tanhold fever this fall, the town has been to the control of the contr typhoid fever this fall, the town has been remarkably free from contagious and other diseases, I submit the following table of con-

prompt reporting and isolation of all suspected cases by the medical attendants and to the thorough disinfection of the premises and all contaminated articles, under the supervision of Mr. Doug as, the sanitary inspector.

I wish to call your attention to the necessity of having a public disinfector engaged by the town, who would be responsible for the thorough disinfection of intected premises, etc. Such an officer would be of invaluable use to the board in effectually destroying the germs of

Typhoid fever has been unusually prevalent within the last two months both in the town and country. The same disease has been equally prevalent in all the neighboring towns. Typhoid fever occurs more frequently after a hot and dry summer, when the water in the wells is low. The well water being low more likely to be contaminated with sewerage, and with the coming of the the chief medium through which the poison enters the human body. Every fort should therefore be made to have puse and wholesome water for domestic

purposes. In my report last year I stated that no case of contagious disease had been reported by any of the residents who use town water, and I am pleased to have the same favorable report to make this

The town of Lindsay is favorably situated for avoiding the dangers which result from the poliution of wells with sewerage. Abundance of pure spring water, and in many parts of the town flowing wells can be found by digging down or boring from ten to twenty feet. I would therefore recommend that the town council pass a by-law prohibiting the use of stoned wells, and making is compulsory upon the citizens to construct wells in such a manner that surface water shall be thoroughly excluded.

In this connection, the matter of privy pits and so called dry earth closets may properly be referred to. Wherever a privy pit exists pollution of a neighboring well may be looked for. The same may be said of dry earth closets as we have them. The liquid contents dilute the solid matter in the boxes, and when the boxes are not water-tight, as is too often the case, the diluted matter contaminates the soil and may percolate into the neighboring wells. It would, therefore, be in the interest of the public health if a by-law were passed prohibiting the use of privy pits and ill constructed dry earth closets within the limits of the corporation, and substituting properly constructed dry-earth closets. The sanitary inspecior has reported that a number of yards, cellars and stables, in different parts of the town, were in an unsanitary condition. These cases have been satisfactorily attended to. Samples of water from suspected wells have been analyzed and some of the wells have been con-

demned as unfit for use. During the summer numerous complaints were made about the drain on the north side of Bond street, and several investigations were made by myself and the sautary inspector, and although the drain at the east end was found to be in a filthy condition, apparently from the decomposition of sewage poured into the drain from one or more of the residences higher up the street, we were unable to find who the guilty parties are, as they all deny that sewage enters the drain from their houses.

I would recommend that the council uncover the drain and use it as an open drain between Albert and Cambridge streets, thereby preventing the concentra-tion of the Bond st. filth at the Cambridge at. end of this closed drain. A sanitary system of disposing of sewage is necessary to secure public health, and in the abscence of such a system the counsil should not allow one citizen to convey his sewage through a closed drain and deposis it at the front door of his neighbor, I would also suggest that the Kent-st. that flush tanks be placed in the sewer, and that proper traps be placed in the catch basins, so that the sewer can be used for what it was originally intended.



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
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
