Report for the week ending Saturday night, July 31st, 1897, from Lindsay observatory:—

Note.—The meteorological conditions for July were unusual in two particulars, the continuous great heat without rain during the first ten days, and the comparatively cool weather with nearly centinuous and heavy rains during the last ten days.

and 96°.8 on 6th, 1886. The mean temperature of the warmest day, the 5th, 84°.8, exceeded that of the warmest day heretofore recorded by 5°.17. The nearest approach to it was 79°.63 on the 9th, 1880.

Heavy rain fell on eight of the last tendays. The greatest quantity, 1.90 inches, fell on Tuesday, 27th. The total for the eight days was 5.77 inches, and the total for the month 6.12 inches. The greatest quantity which fell on any previous day in July during the past seventeen years was 1.80 inches on 27th, 1882, but the total for the month was only 31 inches. The largest total for the month in any year during that period was 4.37 inches in 1889. Therefore the quantity of rain which fell during the last ten days was 1.75 inches more than the total for any month previously recorded.
