We are glad that our law disapproves of drinking under 21 years of age; but why should the word "apparently," the permissible "written order," and the paltry penalty for infraction, leave open a side door for escape ? If a saloonkeeper steals my horse, he goes to the penitentiary; if he steals my heart's blood, my boy—he is fined \$10! THE POLITICAL TRICESTER.

What has been the matter? Certainly the noose fell over the head of the Ontario license system. The people lassoced it through the ballot box. How comes it that this commercial desperado is still at large? Here is the secret. The political trickster managed the slip knot, by the means of iccal committees. "What would you have?" asked the

local committee. The government is pledged to you and the candidate is pledged to the government. Where is the use of asking embarrassing questions, or insisting on fresh pledges?" And though the candidate's past record, or well known character, may have been destructive of confidence in his elneerity, the christian voters of this province supported him. A little later we were told by the Premier that the "skeleton temperance measure" (as some at first hopefully called it), introduced in March was all that his followers would sustain him in passing. This evidently was true, because an attempt to put a little flesh on its bones was a signal failure and served only to show us that the issue was a government one in name

WHO IS RESPONSIBLE? Who is primarily responsible for this iniquitous outcome of a great moral movement? The deluded christian elector, whose political standard of ethics is, "of two evils choose the least." Christ never taught it—the principles of the Book are dead against it, and until Christ's citizens declare "we will be represented by true men, or none," and then back up their professions at the ward committees, the nominating conventions and the ballot box, the reign of righteousness so long delayed, so bitterly needed, will never be ushered in.

A Connecticut white ribboner told me, this summer, that in one of their towns a moral question was to the fore. The people were in favor of it, but its success depended on the candidate elected. With cunning craft the politicians placed the nominating convention on the town prayer-meeting night. A prominent minister went to his church, and after explaining matters addressed his congregation thus: "Brethren, I am going over to that convention, I invite every man here having a vote, to go with me. We will, to-night, leave the sisters to do the praying." And with one accord the male section of that meeting adjourned, frus trated the scheme of the enemy and answered the sisters' prayers.

Says Dr. Carlos Martyn, in the Homiletic Review: "A proper ethical teaching ought to persuade the voter that, as baptism and the Lord's supper are twin sacraments of the church, so the primary and the ballot box are twin sacraments of the state, and that each election day is a Sabbath of patriotism, which God commands him to remember and keep holy." We are closing what at the last annual convention we expected would be the plebiscite year, and still that great event is ahead of us. I do not remember to have attended a county convention, for six months back, without being publicly asked this question: "Do you believe there will be a plebiscite?" Why any such doubt should be abroad, unless a product of Ontario's sad experiences, I cannot conceive. The Dominion government secured the people's support in lieu of three pledges -to settle the Manitoba school embroglio and the tariff and to allow the people to settle the prohibition problem. We have not yet reached that stage of development when our rulers recognize the superiority of spiritual over mental and material concerns, consequently the school difficulty took precedence, the financial issue absorbed the second session, and there is nothing now left hut prohibition. Surely it must have right of way at this winter's parliament. We have no doubt but that we shall have the plebiscite.
