

Contagious Diseases.

Some time ago a child worst type of pox of the face in which the spots occurred was vaccinated for a while but was not disinfected, as it ought to have been, and in consequence one of the children of the next tenant, a newly arrived English immigrant, died of the same disease. The case is being somewhat severely commented on by the *Globe*, which draws attention to the following clauses of the Public Health Act:

Clause 18.—Whenever any householder shall know that any person within his family has the smallpox or any other disease dangerous to the public health, he shall immediately give notice thereof to the local Board of Health, or to the health officers of the municipality in which he resides.

Clause 19.—Whenever any physician shall know that any person whom he is called upon to visit is infected with the smallpox or any other disease dangerous to the public health, such physician shall immediately give notice thereof to the local Board of Health or health officers of the municipality in which such diseased person may be.

The practicability of storing electricity has been demonstrated on an Atlantic steamship, in which electric lamps, lighted before leaving Harve, afforded constant light until New York was reached.

Dynamite outrages are becoming frequent in the United States. An obnoxious saloon was blown up at Palestine, Indiana, on Saturday last, and a bomb exploded in the streets of Rochester, N. Y., on Sunday.

That was two years ago, at which time the proceeding caused considerable comment.
