The number of suicides in the United States last year, as closely as can be figured, was 7,000, and the majority of these were farmers and farmers' wives.

Ex-Premier John Norquay, of Manitoba, died suddenly of heart disease at his residence in Winnipeg on Friday, the 5th inst. He was born at Red River on May 8th, 1841.

Recent Australian papers announce the finding of a nugget weighing 336 ounces and valued at £1,360. It was found near Wedderburn, Victoria, by a young Australian named Costa Ciochich, who had only recently arrived in the colony.

Out in Nevada electricity runs the very deep mines, and has increased production 25 per cent. The men who work 3,100 feet deep live about two years, notwithstanding the fact that they work only two hours per day. They get more pay than the eight hour men. They work 15 minutes and rest 45.

The Galveston News says that more cattle have been shipped from Texas to the North this season than for many years, although actual figures are hard to obtain, from the fact that thousands of cattle have been driven, besides those that have been shipped on the different railroads; 2,030 carloads of cattle, with a total of 40,600 head, have passed through Fort Worth alone in one month.

A man by the name of George Graub, living in the village of Jordan, committed suicide on July the 4th by taking Paris green. Before death he remarked that had he known it was going to give him so much pain he would not have taken it, and that he expected he would fall over just like a potato bug. About a year ago Graub endeavored to kill himself by getting on to the house top and rolling from the roof. That time he only succeeded in slightly hurting himself.

To the Editor of the Fenelon Falls Gazette.

Sir,—I see by your paper of June 28th that Ratepayers is still unsatisfied. I think, in justice to the majority of our ratepayers, that he should change his name and take unto himself the name and style of Chronic Grumbler, a name that I am sure all just ratepayers will consider very appropriate. There are many ratepayers in this municipality, and some of them poor men too, who, I am sure, would not like to be suspected of writing any such narrow-minded, selfish, dog-in-the-manger styles of epistles as have lately appeared in the issues of your paper. In his last he says the constable was instructed to impound all pigs running at large, and to take legal proceedings against all parties piling wood on the street. Now, in the first place, the constable should not have been told to impound pigs, as every one will agree with me in saying that pigs at large are an insufferable nuisance, and will do damage whenever they can without fear of law or pound; and the only thing necessary to stop them running at large was a pound-keeper, and I think the council for this year have filled that vacancy to the satisfaction of all opposed to pigs running at large.

Now, as to the piling of slabs, I may say that the streets have been used as piling ground for slabs and wood for years both by rich and poor, and no complaint was ever made, as the only damage done was the killing of the grass from the poor man's cow. But when the matter was brought to the knowledge of the present council and they saw that it should be stopped, they instructed the constable to order the removal of all slabs and wood, and prevent any further piling; and as Mr. Jackett, the chief of the offenders, stated that he would ship his slabs as soon as he could get cars, and clean the street afterwards, and we (the council) being human and not tyrants, further instructed our constable to allow a reasonable time to all parties concerned; and I think I am safe in saying that there is not another ratepayer except your chronic grumbler who will say we did wrong. It requires no mathematical problem to tell the difference between chronic grumblers, slabs and hogs, and I think the ratepayers will be able to decide before the end of the year whether the council of this year are in earnest or not.
