The roll was then called with all members present.

The Clerk then read Rule No. 2 of the Rules-of-Order governing the Election of Warden, after which he announced that he was ready to receive nominations for the election of Warden for the year 1934.

The time having elapsed for receiving nominations, no other having been received than that for Mathew Rankin, Reeve of Dover Township, he was declared duly elected Warden of the County of Kent for the year 1934.

Mr. Cranston and Mr. Scriven, mover and seconder of the nomination of Mr. Rankin, then escorted him to the Clerk's desk where he subscribed to the oath of office and thence to the Warden's Chair.

The Warden addressed the Council, thanking them for the honour they had conferred upon him and mentioning some of the business to come before the Council at this Session. He then invited Ex-Wardens Messrs. Mills, Hinnegan, Miller, Fletcher, Smith, Vance, M. J. Wilson, W. R. Leverton, Holmes and F. A. Leverton, also Rev. A. C. Calder, M.L.A. for West Kent, and Douglas Campbell, M.L.A.

for East Kent, all of whom addressed the Warden congratulating him upon his election to the Chair, and offering some timely advice to Members of the Council.

The Warden then requested the Rev. A. C. Calder to open the Session with Prayer, which he did.

The Minutes of the December 7th meetings were read and approved.

The resignation of Mathew Rankin on the Road Committee was read and accepted.

On motion of Messrs. Gregory and Scriven, the Council went into a Committee of the whole Council to select the two members to fill the vacancies on the Road Committee.

The Warden requested Mr. Scriven to take the Chair which he did.

The Council resumed and the Chairman reported that Mr. Alfred Giddis had been appointed a Member of the Kent County Road Committee for the years 1934, 1935, 1936, 1937, 1938; and that Mr. Clarence Cranston had been appointed to finish out the term of office on the Road Committee of Mathew Rankin for the years 1934, 1935 and 1936.

On motion of Messrs. Scriven and Edwards their report was adopted.

On motion of Messrs. Giddis and Cofell the Council decided that all Members of the Old Age Pensions Board should be Members of the County Council.

On motion of Messrs. Truesdale and Giddis, Messrs.

Johnston and Herbert were reappointed members of the Kent County Cemetery Commission.

On motion of Messrs. Scriven and Cranston the Countil went into a Committee of the Whole Council to select the Members for the Old Age Pensions Board for the year 1934.

The Warden requested Mr. Cranston to take the Chair, which he did.

The Council resumed and the Chairman reported that Messrs. Wilson, Lawrence, Edwards, Truesdale and Abraham constitute the Old Age Pensions Board for the year 1934.

On motion of Messrs. Cranston and McKim their report was adopted.

On motion of Messrs. Gregory and Woods, the Warden was requested to name the Committee to strike the Standing Committees.

The Council met in the Council Chambers at 2 p.m. with the Warden in the Chair.

The roll was called with all members present.

On motion of Messrs. McKim and Truesdale a deputation from Dresden, Wallaceburg and vicinity was heard within the bar.

Ex-Mayor J. T. Saint of Wallaceburg, ex-Mayor Roy Carscallen of Dresden, ex-Warden F. A. Hinnegan, Clarence Craven and William Glasgo of the delegation addressed the Council requesting to have extensive repairs made to that portion of the pavement on County Road leading north out of Wallaceburg as far as McGregor's Corner.—Referred to County Roads Committee.

On motion of Messrs. Montgomery and Woods, Mr. Forsythe, representing the Kent County Plowmen's Association was heard within the bar.

Mr. Forsythe addressed the Council requesting a grant of \$100.00 to their association.—Referred to Finance Committee.

On motion of Messrs, Giddis and McKay a deputation from Howard Township.

Mr. M. J. Lyden, on behalf of the delegation requested the County to improve the balance of Road No. 18 through to Provincial Highway No. 21 this year.—Referred to County Road Committee.

On motion of Messrs. Wilson and Cudmore, Mr. Maynard representing the Ont. Corn Growers' Association was heard within the bar.

Mr. Maynard on behalf of the Association requested a grant of \$200.00 to assist in the prize list for the 1934 Corn Show.—Referred to Finance Committee.

On motion of Messrs. Gregory and McDonald, Dr. M. H. Macklin, representing the Eugenic Society of Canada, was heard within the bar.

Dr. Macklin addressed the Council at considerable length and gave a very instructive and interesting address on the sterilization of mentally deficient persons requesting the Council to endorse the action of the Society in petitioning the Government to legalize voluntary sterilization of the mentally deficient.—Referred to Petition and Legislation Committee.

The Warden thanked Dr. Macklin and promised her that the Council would give her request very careful and earnest consideration.

On motion of Messrs. Stewart and Montgomery, Mr. C. H. Bellamy was heard within the bar.

Mr. Bellamy addressed the Council requesting the County to take some action to create interest in the subject of reforestration.—Referred to Agricultural Committee.

The County Treasurer presented his statement of Arrears of Taxes.

On motion of Messrs. Gregory and Wilson his report was received and ordered printed in the January minutes.

The Treasurer read a number of letters in reference to the adjusting of certain amounts of money in dispute in reference to the Chatham-Dover Townline pavement and the hold back on the 1932 County Road Subsidy.

Mr. Eaton, District Engineer of Municipal Roads also made some explanations in reference to the above matters and he then invited all the members and officials and anyone interested in good roads to attend the meeting of the Kent-Essex Good Roads Association to be held in Harrison Hall on the 6th and 7th of February.

Mr. Colby, County Road Supt., presented his estimated expenditures on county roads for 1934.

On motion of Messrs. Edwards and Cranston his report was tabled.

Moved by Mr. L. C. Truesdale, seconded by Mr. Earl C. Montgomery:

THAT WHEREAS owing to the Department of Highways having deducted from the Kent County Road Subsidy of 1932 \$10,295.54 on account of certain government grants having been made by them to the Burke Drainage Scheme in the Township of Harwich, this Council at the December session last, authorized the deduction of the said \$10,295.54 from the 20% County's share of the Provincial Highway expenditure during 1932.

AND WHEREAS a County cheque for \$4,202.11 was forwarded to the Department in December, 1933 which was considered to be a settlement in full of the County's account.

AND WHEREAS the Department of Highways by letter to the County Treasurer dated January 18th has made the request that this Council pay over to the Department of Highways the balance due, namely \$10,295.48 with the understanding that the Department of Highways pay over to the County \$8,295.03, along with the Government Road Subsidy for 1933, being the balance of the County of Kent Road Subsidy for 1932.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the County Engineer and Road Superintendent be instructed to accompany with his report to the Department of Highways of the 1933 county road expenditure an amount equal to the \$8,925.03 as being the balance due Kent County on account of its 1932 subsidy, also that the County Treasurer be authorized and instructed to issue a cheque to the Department of Highways for the said \$10,295.48 and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Department of Highways along with the cheque.

Carried in open Council.

Moved by Frank Woods, seconded by C. E. Johnston:

THAT WHEREAS the Ontario Department of Highways has made a request that the County of Kent issue a further cheque to them for \$127,339.76 which along with the cheque issued in December for the same amount would make the total cost of the Chatham-Wallaceburg pavement put down in 1930 and wholly paid for at that time by the Department of Highways.

AND WHEREAS the letter dated Jan. 18, 1934 to the County Treasurer from the Highway Department assures the County that the second cheque for \$127,339.76 will not be cashed by the Department until such time as a cheque for the 1933 subsidy which includes a like amount payable to the County of Kent will be issued by the Treasurer of Ontario, being 50% subsidy on the total cost of the said Chatham-Wallaceburg pavement.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the County Engineer and Road Superintendent, Mr. Colby be instructed to include in his 1933 Kent County road expenditures report to the Ontario Department of Highways the total cost of the Chatham-Wallaceburg pavement namely \$254,679.52 in order that the subsidy on this amount will be equal to the proposed cheque of \$127,339.76, which will be sent to the Department of Highways at once, also that the County Treasurer is hereby authorized and instructed to issue to the Department of Highways the said cheque for \$127,-339.76, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Department of Highways along with the above mentioned cheque.

Carried in open Council.

The Clerk drew to the attention of the Council the matter of the Canadian Bank of Commerce requesting the County to use their form of by-law for borrowing for general county purposes.

On motion of Messrs. Truesdale and Lawrence the Council decided to use the form provided by the bank.

On motion of Messrs. Gregory and Woods the following by-laws were introduced and read a first time:

A By-law to borrow money for General County Purposes.

A By-law to appoint certain County Officers.

A By-law to Confirm and Legalize Grants.

A By-law to appoint a Cemetery Commission.

A By-law to appoint an Old Age Pensions Board.

A By-law to provide for expenditures on County Highways.

A By-law to authorize the Warden and Treasurer to borrow money for Highway Purposes.

On motion of Messrs. McDonald and Montgomery the Council adjourned until 10 a.m. tomorrow morning.

Mr. Giddis made a verbal report as a member of the special committee appointed at the December session to indeavour to find ways and means for better control of the perennial sow thistle suggesting that W. R. Reek, B.S.A., address the Council on this subject.

Mr. Gregory also spoke to the question stating that the matter could not be too strongly stressed.

On motion of Messrs. Giddis and Gregory the Council decided to invite Mr. Reek to address them on the above mentioned subject and Mr. Giddis to extend the invitation to him.

The Treasurer presented a statement of the standing of the County's finances for the year 1933.

Mr. Drury, County Auditor, presented and explained his statement and report of County expenditures for the year 1933.

On motion of Messrs. Wilson and McDonald his report was adopted and ordered printed in the January minutes.

The Warden drew to the attention of the Council the necessity of making a new agreement with the City of Chatham in reference to the Administration of Justice, Harrison Hall, Registry Office and other matters in which the County and City are jointly interested.

On motion of Messrs. Springsteen and Wilson the Warden was requested to name a committee to prepare the five year agreement with the City of Chatham.

The Warden named the Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, R. J. Wilson, Scriven and the Warden.

W. M. Abraham, Inspector of Harrison Hall, presented his annual report.

On motion of Messrs. Wilson and Cudmore his report was referred to Harrison Hall Committee.

Mr. Jones gave notice that this afternoon he would bring in a motion re a special grant to the Town of Wallaceburg to assist in resurfacing Wallace Street.

Mr. Edwards gave notice that tomorrow morning he would bring in a motion re paving on provincial highways for 1934.

Mr. Stewart gave notice re the appointment of certain committees.

On motion of Messrs. Wilson and Gregory a by-law to appoint two members to the Road Committee was introduced and read a first time.

On motion of Messrs. Herbert and Cofell the Council adjourned until 2 p.m. this afternoon.

The Council met in the Council Chambers with the Warden in the Chair at 2.30 p.m.

The roll was called with all members present.

A number of accounts for committee and mileage were read and referred to the Finance Committee.

On motion of Messrs. McDonald and Cranston a representative from the Salvation Army Rescue Home was heard within the bar.

Their representative addressed the Council thanking them for their generous grants and explaining the work being done by the Rescue Home.

Mr. Gregory, chairman of the County Roads Committee, presented and read their report.

On motion of Messrs. Springsteen and Cranston the report was referred back to the Committee to be amended that in view of the fact that the Blenheim council had changed their minds in reference to the surfacing of Marlborough street in the town and now desire to do this work under the unemployment relief plan. Therefore item one, page ten, be transferred to item three and item one be struck from the report.

On motion of Messrs. Gregory and Woods their report was adopted as amended.

Mr. R. J. Wilson, chairman of the Old Age Pensions Board, presented and read their report.

On motion of Messrs. R. J. Wilson and McDonald their report was adopted, and ordered printed in the January minutes.

W. M. Abraham, Inspector of House of Refuge, presented and read his annual report.

On motion of Messrs. McKay and McDonald his report was referred to the House of Refuge Committee.

Mr. McKay inquired if it was the intention to conclude the session on Friday.

The Warden replied that it was.

Mr. Fletcher on behalf of the Kent Municipal Association requested a grant of \$35.00.—Referred to Finance Committee.

The Clerk reported that he had been instructed by the ex-Warden that the Kent County boy who was awarded the Massey Fund Scholarship was James Barclay.

On motion of Messrs. Gregory and Giddis this report was received and a grant of \$50.00 authorized to be paid as Kent County's share to the above mentioned fund.

On motion of Messrs. Woods and Montgomery the Rules of Order were suspended in order to receive several motions.

Moved by L. L. Gregory, seconded by Frank Woods:

That this Council petition the Ontario Government for the statutory grant on an expenditure of \$386,914.56 during the year 1933 on county roads and bridges.

Carried in open Council.

Moved by Mr. E. R. Stewart, seconded by Mr. B. Mc-Kim:

That the Chairman of Finance be appointed a member of the Public General Hospital board for 1934.

2. That the Chairman of Finance, Warden and Clerk be a committee to pass all accounts for 1934.

Carried in open Council.

Moved by Mr. C. Cranston, seconded by Mr. J. A. Mc-Donald:

That the Agricultural Advisory Committee be composed of Messrs. Herbert, Giddis, Gregory, Cranston and Edwards.—Carried in open Council.

Moved by Mr. Truesdale, seconded by Mr. McKim:

That the Ice Jam Committee be composed of Messrs. Cameron, Montgomery and Johnston.—Carried in open Council.

Moved by Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Cameron:

That owing to the enormous amount of traffic to the beet factory the pavement on Wallace Street has become damaged to such an extent that it is necessary to resurface it this year, and as the beet industry is a great asset to the surrounding county, the Town of Wallaceburg respectfully requests the County of Kent to give a grant to \$500.00 to assist in resurfacing the said Wallace Street pavement.—Referred to County Roads.

On motion of Messrs. Wilson and Woods, Col. H. D. Smith was heard within the bar.

GENTLEMEN,—

As instructed by your honorable body I herewith submits program of Estimates of County Road Expenditures for the year 1934.

I have included in this report the cost of construction of the County bridge over the River Sydenham at Dresden. This bridge was opened for traffic on December 29th, 1933, but the cost of

which is to be taken care of in the 1934 rates.

The County's share, namely 50% of \$254,679.52 or \$127,339.76 of the cost of the concrete pavement constructed in 1930 on the Chatham-Dover Townline from the road between Concessions 5 and 6 to the Elbow road, a distance of 10.2 miles, has been raised during the years 1932 and 1933 and payments made to the Department of Highways, who financed the work.

The County has no debenture debt nor has had since the Highway Improvement Act was adopted in 1917 and I trust we will continue steadfast with that principle for we cannot estimate what the future holds for roadbuilding. I would prefer the "pay as you go" policy, with a steady development in keeping with traffic demands

and the finances of the county.

The dust nuisance on gravel roads has developed considerably since the roads have obtained a high speed surface and I am of the opinion that a determined effort will have to be made to effectively combat this menace, both to conserve materials in the road and to safeguard health and the destruction of crops both in the field and orchard. The low cost pavement seems at this time to be an effective solution, while it is not intended to withstand continuous heavily-loaded traffic with its initial construction, additional thickness can be acquired from time to time to gradually build up a depth of pavement sufficient for such traffic, but it will effectively lay the dust and conserve materials as well as reduce maintenance. A start was made in 1932. Other stretches appear in this report.

The Department of Labor of Ontario in order to provide labor for men have offered an additional subsidy on labor costs for work that would be deferred until later. If this is extended during the summer months this report will relieve to some extent the labor sit-

uation.

These estimates call for a 1.80 mill rate to be raised for County Road purposes as against a 2.55 mill rate last year, and which is as follows:

Grand Jury's Report

Chatham, Ont., December 14,1934.

To His Honour, Judge McFadden:

We, your Grand Jurors, wish to express our thanks for the comprehensive charge you delivered which outlined clearly the purpose, the powers and the rights of Grand Juries in general and of this Grand Jury in particular. To most of our members, in fact with two exceptions, this has been our first experience in serving as Grand Jurors. We approached our duties, with vague ideas as to what they were, and, possibly owing to the agitation for the abolishing of Grand Juries which does exist, and to which you referred in your charge, we may have come feeling that our duties were merely perfunctory in nature, and that, being at best only a necessary evil, the greatest service we could perform would be to secure our discharge at the earliest possible moment.

Your charge disabused our minds of all such misapprehensions and we cannot help but feel that had all Grand Juries had the privilege of receiving a charge such as the one you delivered to us the results of their investigations and suggestions might have been such as to justify beyond any doubt the possibilities for good in this institution.

In this connection we believe that it would be most desirable that, when notices are sent to attend for Grand Jury duty, an outline of the duties and perogatives of a Grand Juror should accompany it. From our own experience we believe that Jurors would come better prepared to give the efficient service, which should be expected of them. We earnestly commend this thought to the Sheriff for his consideration, and if any changes in legislation should be ne-

cessary in order to do this, we empower him to forward our recommendation to the proper persons, if, in his opinion, it will assist in securing such changes.

UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF

Your Grand Jury believes it is more desirable to supply work than provide direct relief. We believe that the time has arrived when the Provincial and Dominion Governments are justified in embarking on some plan of providing work through undertaking the construction of necessary public works or works which will be necessary in the near future. We urge upon all authorities whose responsibility it is to look after the relief of unemployment to provide this relief through carrying on all work which is necessary at this time and to anticipate their needs of the next few years.

We do not think that we have enough information to make definite recommendations on the various schemes referred to in your Honour's charge, such as the bringing of water to the City of Chatham from Lake Erie or other sources; the diversion of "McGregor's Creek", the construction of a turning basin in the River Thames at Chatham and the dredging of the River. We commend these schemes to the authorities interested for careful consideration, especially the construction of the turning basin and the dredging of the river.

HARRISON HALL

This building during the last year has been painted and redecorated throughout. While the building is old, this has resulted in a brighter and fresher general appearance. There are, however, certain conditions which we believe could be corrected at no great expense and which should be corrected. In the Judge's Chambers a proper desk and chair for the stenographer should be provided. The present table and chair, which has to be cushioned with thick books is entirely inadequate. A new typewriter is needed. The Judge's chair should be replaced or the present one reupholstered. Many of the chairs in this room are in need of repair or replacement. Names of Judges long dead should be removed from office doors.

There is no men's toilet on the first floor and the one in the basement is in a deplorable condition. The old brick floor in the basement should be re-surfaced. The entire basement needs a thorough house cleaning. Old books and records which are piled promiscuously, without any apparent order, should be sorted out, and those which are of value properly taken care of.

We believe the present janitress is doing her work to the best of her ability, but believe that extra help is needed to put this building in proper condition and keep it so.

More modern steel filing cabinets are needed in the vault in the Clerk of the Court's office.

In the Sheriff's office the floor covering is in such condition that it is hard to clean and, in our opinion, unsanitary and should be replaced.

The furniture in the office of the Court Stenographer is ancient and outworn and should be replaced.

A drinking fountain with cooling system should be installed on the first floor.

COURT HOUSE AND JAIL

Number of prisoners: 2 female, 38 male.

The jail was inspected during meal time and we comment favourably upon the food and the manner in which it is served. Approved reading matter seems to be lacking and should be supplied by the various city organizations.

The cell system and jail equipment are modern and quite adequate to the need of the County. Bed springs in the cells seem unnecessarily hard and should be replaced at once with a different type.

Janitor service for the Court House is well performed, but we recommend that some official be authorized to look after and be responsible for minor repairs and upkeep of furnishings. In the Court Room we find thirteen cane bottom chairs with bottoms out, drawers without bottoms, all drawers with missing pulls, floor linoleums cracking and joints in need of cementing. Judge's chair particularly in need of new upholstery or entire replacement. Room for Grand Jury is altogether too small and unventilated, the only windows in same being nailed up. We recommend that another room be given for this purpose.

The Court House building is far from modern and in no wise a credit to or commensurate with the needs of this County and until conditions warrant a new and modern building, to include all County Offices, immediate attention should be given to furnishings which are not in keeping with the dignity of the Court.

THE HOUSE OF REFUGE

Number of inmates: 37 men and 17 women.

In making a visit to the House of Refuge we were very cordially welcomed and on making our tour of inspection of outdoor buildings we found barn, chicken coop and feed storage very satisfactory. Upon entering the Home we found the place is kept very clean and the inmates contented in every way. We visited the Home as dinner was being prepared and the Matron should be commended upon the food that was being prepared and served to the inmates. In conversation with the inmates we found they were very satisfied in the way they were taken care of.

We, as the Grand Jury, recommend that some institution or organization, if possible, supply the inmates with reading matter. The only method they have at present to employ some of the inmates is by letting them pick beans.

We were advised that a supply of native tobacco which has been on hand is nearly exhausted, and suggest that a donation of homegrown tobacco would be appreciated.

We found everything in excellent shape, with the exception of a few minor repairs. The eavestroughs on the Home should be replaced by new, as they are in bad state and are causing decay in different places. We understand that it is planned to take care of these repairs in the spring.

HOME OF THE FRIENDLESS

There were 33 inmates, 24 male and 9 female—all comfortable and contented. We found this institution in splendid condition: clean, warm and sanitary and a great credit to the ladies of the Home Board. After talking privately

with many of the inmates, we are convinced that everything possible is being done for their happiness and comfort.

CHILDREN'S SHELTER

Number of inmates, 25.

We visited the Children's Shelter on Park Avenue East in Chatham, arriving just as the children were having their evening meal. We found at this institution absolutely nothing to criticize. The building is modern, commodious and excellently furnished, many of the rooms having been furnished by private individuals or societies. The building is well planned for the purpose for which it is used. Apparently everything is provided to make the lot of the little inmates as happy and comfortable as possible. We talked with the children, both in the presence of the supervisors and themselves. There is no doubt in our minds that they were enjoying their meal. They were happy and smiling. They told us that they liked their home. We commend the Matron and others in charge for the manner in which they are carrying out their duties, and the Society in charge for the excellent supervision they must be giving.

HOSPITALS

We have visited both hospitals and inspected the public wards, the kitchens, the operating rooms and the nurseries in each institution. At both places we were impressed with the fact that the County is most fortunate in being served by two such modern, well equipped and well managed institutions. Those in charge are to be commended for the high state of efficiency to which the hospitals have been brought and this Grand Jury, on behalf of the people of the County whom we represent, does extend hearty commendations.

We have passed on all criminal cases which have been presented to us, and have previously reported to you the results of our findings.

We wish to thank and commend your Honour and the Crown Attorney for the clearness with which the various cases were outlined to us, and the Crown Attorney for the dispatch and straightforwardness with which he presented the evidence to us in each case.

During the Session of Court a situation has arisen which, if possible, should be avoided. A large panel of Petit Jurors has been kept waiting for the greater part of two days, doing nothing, at great expense to the County and, no doubt, at great personal inconvenience. This apparently, has not been the fault of any official. Plans had been laid out which would have avoided this, but which unavoidably miscarried.

We therefore, recommend:

That at Sessions of the Court at which there are no civil jury cases listed, the Grand Jurors should be called one day previous to the Petit Jurors. Should changes in legislation be necessary in order that this can be done, we suggest that the proper authorities be approached with this object in view.

All of which we submit to Your Honour for your consideration.

To the Warden and Council, County of Kent.

Gentlemen:

On behalf of the Chatham Suburban Road Commission I beg to submit the following report in reference to the year 1933.

During the year the total amount expended on the roads under the jurisdiction of the Commission was \$1157.66, all being expended for maintenance. Of this total \$318.00 was expended on Road 10 Suburban (Raleigh and Harwich Townline), \$307.15 on Road 14 Suburban (Creek Road Harwich), \$280.14 on Road 30 Suburban (Chatham and Dover Townline) and \$252.37 on Road 34 Suburban (River Road Dover). This represents a very substantial reduction as compared with the year 1932 when the total expenditure was \$3,105.55, and the expenditure for 1933 has also been substantially less than estimated. One reason for the expenditure being less than expected was that the Commission found it possible to carry over until 1934 the rebuilding of the bridge over the Brown Drain on Road 30 Suburban for which work \$900.00 was included in the estimates for 1933.

The Commission has carefully considered the work necessary for 1934 and has approved the following estimates.

In connection with the above estimates it might be pointed out that there is every expectation that the Province will take over as a provincial highway Road No. 30 (Chatham and Dover Townline) and that if this is done the Commission will be relieved of responsibility in regard to that road and the above estimates could be then substantially reduced. Even if this road should not be taken over by the Government it is possible that the rebuilding of the Brown Drain Bridge could be further delayed and if this can be done the expenditure will be correspondingly reduced.

A detailed statement of the expenditures for 1933 has been submitted with this report.

Our Solicitor informs us that the County would be quite within their rights by by-law to guarantee the payment of the mortgage on the Children's Shelter. If this guarantee is given, however, there should be an agreement with the City of Chatham with an understanding from them that they would go jointly on this guarantee with the County. This agreement should also provide that the responsibility should be borne in respect to the portion which each contributed to the maintenance of the Shelter at the time of the enforcement of the guarantee.

Your Committee recommends that in view of the fact that the County do not own the Shelter and that the guarantee of the mortgage by the County and City would be somewhat of a complicated agreement that the County do not guarantee the mortgage.

To the Warden and Members, Kent County Council.

Gentlemen:

As Inspector of the House of Refuge and Industrial Farm I beg leave to make my annual report.

As I pointed out in my report of January, 1933, there is need of considerable repairs to the buildings. The House should be painted on the outside, eave troughs repaired or replaced. The heating system is very poor, there are also a number of rooms which are not provided with radiators. Some time the whole system should be renovated to give the desired results. The south side of the barn roof and the hog-pen roof are in need of shingling with minor repairs

to the floor and foundation, or possibly a new floor. The barn-yard in my opinion is much too large and should be reduced in size and rearranged.

The Superintendent and Matron have their work well in hand and are careful and painstaking. The Hospital Department, in charge of Miss Wilson, the nurse, is proving, I believe, beneficial and economical. In this connection the nurse's work quite frequently becomes very strenuous.

The following is the Superintendent's report to me. which I am pleased to say shows a further weekly reduction per inmate over 1932. In 1932 the average cost per week (not taking credit for Old Age Pension receipts nor charging the House with the amounts allowed the pensioners out of the pensions) was \$3.08 3-5. This year figuring on the same basis the cost is \$2.69 1-9 per week. The method however which is used in this report is to charge the House with 10% of the pension receipts as well as the amounts allowed the Old Age Pensioners, but taking credit for all of the Old Age Pension receipts, thus lowering the cost per week to \$2.03 2-11. In arriving at the cost per week of maintenance all repairs or improvements are of course figured in but it has never been the practice to include a depreciation percentage on the buildings, so the cost of maintenance would vary from year to year according to the amount of repairs, etc., done.

To the Warden and Members, Kent County Council.

Gentlemen:

As Inspector of Harrison Hall, I beg leave to make my annual report.

During 1933 the interior of the building has been painted, two coats throughout (except the County Council Chambers which had three coats) and all wood work varnished. The City also have had their offices and Council Chambers painted in conformity with the rest of the building.

Referring to the Grand Jury's report and particularly that part dealing with the condition of the basement in Harrison Hall, may I refer you to my report dated January 24, 1933 and printed in the 1933 January minutes which deals with some of the complained of conditions in their report. The first item referred to in their comments on the basement is the deplorable condition of the toilets. After reading this report I had our plumber check over the toilets and his report to me was that they were all in good working order, but there was some odor from the floor of the urinal due to the careless manner in which it is used by those having access to it. In this connection I do not refer to the occupants of Harrison Hall but to the general public who get access to the basement.

The next item referred to is the basement floor which they recommend resurfacing, and which in my opinion would not be at all permanent or a first class job, but if desirable or necessary should have the old floor torn up and a new concrete floor laid, the same as was done in the furnace room.

Dealing then with the old books and records stored in the vacant rooms, for some years I have endeavoured to bring some kind of order out of the chaos, but so far have not been able to make much progress in view of the fact that the basement is the place that catches the accumulation of discarded furniture, old records, law books, etc. from all of the County, City and Judicial offices in Harrison Hall, and is also a temporary store room for the County Engineer and to some extent the City Engineer. The chief reason for the accumulation of the books and records is because the County's vault in the basement, owing to a damp condition is not a fit place to store these documents as the ones now stored there are in a very bad state of decay. I believe then the first step to overcome this condition would be if possible to have the vault sealed up and made damp proof, remove all decayed and valueless documents, then sort out and store in the vault all valuable papers, etc. which are stored in the vacant rooms. May I say, however, that unless furniture, fixtures, etc. which are removed from the various offices from time to time are immediately disposed of, the basement cannot be kept in an ideal condition.

The Judge is requesting a new typewriter desk and stenographer's chair for his stenographer, which is needed quite badly. There are also some necessary repairs needed to the chairs or possibly some new ones.

In the County Court Clerk's vault there is need of some new filing sections to replace some old and cumbersome tin boxes in order to properly take care of documents and conserve space. The County Court Clerk is asking for a Linatime for his stenographer.

In the Sheriff's office the old linoleum is in very bad condition, having in the first place been only pieces taken from other offices. The urinal at the head of the stairs on the second floor for some reason is constantly out of repair and owing to this at times becomes very disagreeable, and the matter of its removal I believe might be advisable.

There is a situation which quite frequently arises in connection with the purchasing of supplies and repairs etc. at the County Court House and Jail. While it is the duty of the Sheriff to see that the necessary supplies, etc., are provided the accounts, however, for them are passed and paid quarterly by the Board of Criminal Audit, thus if the Sheriff purchases supplies, etc., the person the goods are purchased from wants his money, the Sheriff must pay it out of his own pocket or present the account to the County for payment, which payment we have really no authority to make. It has been the custom when cases such as this arise for the Governor or Sheriff to consult me on the matter and arrange with the Treasurer for the payment of the account, which strictly speaking, neither the Treasurer nor myself have any right to make. While the by-law setting out my duties as Inspector of Harrison Hall provides that I shall issue all orders for supplies etc. for county offices this is somewhat of a different nature, and I feel that some more definite arrangement should be made.

BY-LAW NO. 1384

A By-law to authorize the Warden and Treasurer of the Corporation of the County of Kent to enter into an agreement for temporary advances and to borrow money under the Highway Improvement Act to meet the costs of road work in progress during the year 1934 in said County.

WHEREAS the County of Kent has adopted a scheme of highway improvements in the said County, under the provisions of the Highway Improvement Act;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the County of Kent is still continuing the work of highway improvement, under the provisions of said Act;

AND WHEREAS the amount to be provided by the Corporation of the said County for such work during the year 1934 is \$210,000.00 and the amount of aid which will be received from the Government of the Province of Ontario for the work to be carried out during the year 1934 is \$60,000.00 and the amount to be received from the City of Chatham, as contribution from suburban roads to be constructed during the year and from other sources, is \$1,000.00.

AND WHEREAS the amount (if any) heretofore borrowed for the purpose aforesaid and outstanding and the amount hereby authorized to be borrowed do not exceed the said sum of \$210,000.00.

AND WHEREAS the amount hereby authorized to be borrowed does not exceed the amount to be so provided by the Corporation of the County during the year 1934, together with the proportion of aid to be so received from the said Province, during the said year and the amount re-

ceivable from the City of Chatham and from other sources as aforesaid;

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Corporation of the County of Kent as follows:

- 1. That the Corporation do agree to borrow and to borrow on terms and subject to the conditions herein mentioned from the Canadian Bank of Commerce, such sums as may be required, but not exceeding in all a total sum of \$210,000.00 to meet the costs of the said work now in progress.
- 2. That within the limit of aforesaid and as monies are from time to time required for the said purpose, the head and Treasurer, on behalf of the Corporation, may obtain advances from the said bank to be credited to the Special Account to be known as the Highway Improvement (Temporary Advance) Account, and may sign, seal, execute and deliver to the said bank such note or notes, as may be necessary, providing for payment of the advances at such time or times and at such rate of interest or discount as may be agreed between them and the bank, such rate, however, not to exceed 5½% per annum, payable monthly, and the bank upon crediting such advances to the said account shall not be bound to inquire as to the application thereof or as to the necessity for the advance.
- 3. The amount so advanced and interest shall be paid by the Corporation to the bank on or before the 31st day of December, 1934, and the monies receivable from the Government of the Province of Ontario, from the City of Chatham and from the ratepayers or on the sale of debentures in respect of the highway improvement work done during the year 1934, shall, when received, be applied on the payment of the advance made by the bank and the bank shall

have a charge on the said monies for the advances made and interest thereon.

FINALLY PASSED in open Council this 26th day of January, A. D. 1934.

BY-LAW NO. 1385

A By-law to amend By-law No. 1335 and to appoint a member of the County Road Committee for a term of five years.

AND WHEREAS the total amount of the estimated revenues of the Municipality as set forth in the estimates adopted for the year 19, not including revenues derivable or derived from arrears of taxes, borrowings and issues of debentures is \$200,000.00.

AND WHEREAS the total amount heretofore authorized to be borrowed this year for the purposes mentioned in

subsection (1) of section of 334 of The Municipal Act is \$, of which the Municipality has already borrowed a total of \$

THEREFORE the Council of the County of Kent hereby enacts as follows:

- 1. The Head and the Treasurer are hereby authorized on behalf of the Municipality to borrow from time to time by way of promissory note from The Canadian Bank of Commerce a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$75,000.00 to meet until the taxes are collected the current expenditures of the Municipality for the year, including the amounts required for the purposes mentioned in subsection (1) of the said section 334, and to give on behalf of the Municipality to the Bank a promissory note or notes sealed with the Corporate Seal and signed by the Head and Treasurer for the moneys so borrowed, with interest, which may be paid in advance or otherwise, at a rate not exceeding five per centum per annum.
- 2. All sums borrowed pursuant to the authority of this by-law as well as all other sums borrowed in this year and in previous years from the said Bank for any or all of the purposes mentioned in the said section 334, shall, with interest thereon, be a charge upon the whole of the revenues of the Municipality for the current year and for all preceding years as and when such revenues are received.
- 3. The Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to apply in payment of all sums borrowed as aforesaid, together with interest thereon, all of the moneys hereafter collected or received either on account or realized in respect of taxes levied for the current year and preceding years or from any other source which may lawfully be applied for such purpose.

- The said monies shall be expended under the direction of the duly appointed County Road Superintendent.
- 4. All work on which the said monies shall be expended shall be performed in accordance with the last revised regulations respecting highways, issued by the Department of Public Highways of Ontario.
- 5. The Clerk shall transmit two certified copies of this By-law to the Deputy Minister, Department of Public Highways of Ontario, within thirty days after the passing thereof.



Harrison Hall, Chatham, Ont., January 25, 1934.

To the Warden and Members, Kent County Council.

Gentlemen,-

I have made an audit of the books, accounts and records of the County of Kent for the year ending December 30, 1933.

The receipts for the year 1933 on General Accounts were \$314,668.39, and on Highway Improvement Account \$165,372.12.

All monies borrowed during the year for General Account have been repaid.

All County Rates were received by the Treasurer in the current year.

There is a surplus in the General Account on December 30, 1933, of \$10,690.95 and a deferred liability to the Province of Ontario of \$56,438.99, being the County portion of Provincial Highway Account for 1933, payable in 1934.

There is a deficit in the Highway Account on December 30, 1938, of \$25,462.13, of which \$8,295.03 is a balance due from the Province of Ontario on 1932 subsidy deferred, and a sum of \$14,294.24, being the County of Kent proportion for Dresden bridge paid during 1933 to be raised in 1934. The balance of the deficit \$2,872.86 will be taken care of in 1934.

All cash and bank balances have been verified.

I have examined the treasurer's bonds and securities and find them in order.

The books and records of the Corporation are being kept in their usual excellent condition.
