Willet Wesley Masters

One of Colborne's oldest residents, Mr. W. W. Masters passed away in Cobourg District General Hospital early Wednesday morning, January 12th, 1962 in his 89th year. He had been in failing health for a few weeks and had been in hospital for five days.

He was born near Warkworth, Ontario, in 1873, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Masters. His early life being spent in this area.

In 1907 he married Miss Jessie McColl of Apsley. Following his marriage he lived at Coe Hill. He came to reside in Salem in 1917, coming to live in Colborne in 1922.

He was a former member of Little Lake Lodge L.O.L. He attended in his earlier years the United Church (then the Methodist Church) in Salem.

He was employed for many years in the lumber camps. When he came to live in this area he worked on the Canadian National Railway. In later years he worked for the Corporation of Colborne.

He is survived by his wife, one daughter Alice (Mrs. Harold Bellamy) Cannington; two grand daughters, Marlyn (Mrs. Robert Beardsall) Orillia, Miss Donna Bellamy, Cannington, one great granddaughter, Miss Sherry Beardsall, Orillia.

Mr. Masters rested at the G. B. Barnes Funeral Home, North Street, Colborne, where many friends and relatives called to pay their respects. The funeral service, which was largely attended, was held Friday, January 12th, 1962 at 2 p.m., conducted by Rev. R. W. French. There were numerous beautiful floral tributes.

Interment was in Salem Cemetery.

The pallbearers were Messrs. Chesel McColl, Leslie McColl, (nephews of the deceased), Apsley; Claude Puffer, Morgantown; Cecil Bellamy, Archie Bellamy and Grant Whaley all of Salem.
