DEANERY SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION HELD HERE

Inspiring Addresses and Discussion Periods Feature Anglican Gathering

The Parishes of Bowmanville, Newcastle, Orono, Port Hope, Cobourg, Colborne, Gores Landing, Perrytown, Harwood and Bewdley were represented at the Deanery of Northumberland and Durham Sunday School Convention in St. John's Parish Hall on Wednesday, Nov. 4th. About 50 delegates were in attendance and the convention opened at 3 o'clock when Rev. C. R. Spencer welcomed the visitors to Bowmanville.

After the usual devotional period, Rev. W. Simpson, B. A., of Millbrook, gave a splendid address on "A Fresh Start in Sunday School Work," after which a discussion period of ten minutes was permitted. At 4 p. m. a round table conference was commenced and conducted by Rev. Mr. Simpson. Sunday school problems which have arisen in many of the schools of the deanery were freely discussed and many new ideas were passed around for the benefit of the whole gathering.

This was followed by a business meeting in which the following were elected officers of the association: President - Mr. E. S. Naylor, Bowmanville; Vice President - Mrs. G. V. Strong, Port Hope; Sec.-Treas. - Mr. M. Lawson, Port Hope. Rev. C. R. Spencer remains Sunday School Supervisor for the entire deanery.

After the business meeting a basket supper was held when the ladies of St. John's Church furnished the coffee and tea and a very pleasant social time was spent. At 7.30 p. m. a short service was held in the church to which many of the congregation attended. Rev. W. Simpson gave the address on "Jesus, the Teacher." An offering was taken to defray the expenses of the convention.
