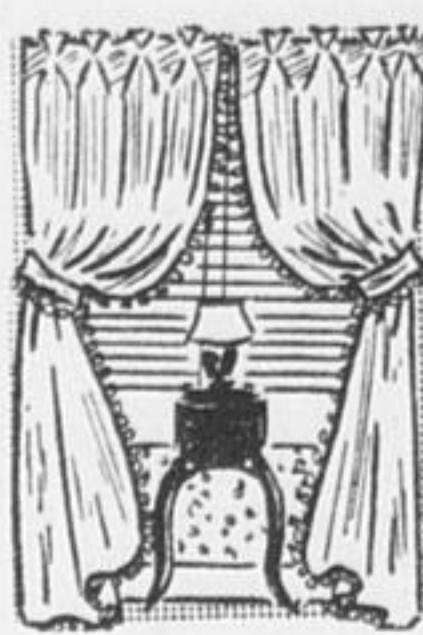
Thirty-Seven Receive Attendance Prizes
