Chair of the Clarington 407 Advisory Committee, a new draft Terms of Reference will be released this spring that will set out how MTO intends to conduct the Environmental Assessment and how they intend to assess "need" for the highway. "If MTO themselves cannot yet say that they have demonstrated the need for Highway 407 out to Highway 115/35, why are Clarington Council and the Region asking MTO to proceed expeditiously with the extension

of Highway 407 to 115/35?" she asks.

In the mean time, a petition, thousands of signatures strong is being circulated throughout the municipality by a resident in support of extending the Highway 407 to

115/35. MPP John O'Toole has extended an invitation to Council to attend the legislature when he brings the petition forward sometime between March 22nd and June 24th.

for the books, throughout the months of January and February, ensuring all Ontarians could participate in the program. A high number of OPP Auxiliary Officers also volunteered daily to sort and package books bound for the north. The OPP, together with the Nishnawbe-Aski Police Service, will deliver the remainder of the books to First Nation communities over the next few months.

As of Sunday, 29 February, OPP detachments will no longer accept books. Volunteers will then focus fulltime on sorting and packaging the many thousands of wonderful books that have been received.

The Lieutenant Governor's Book Program is part of the His Honour's broader efforts to encourage Aboriginal students to pursue reading and education in order to get a good start in life. Mr. Bartleman is spokesperson for the Canadian Rangers Stay in School Program and

often speaks with First Nation students in their schools, via radio and video teleconferencing. Support for Aboriginal youth is a key priority of his mandate as Lieutenant Governor. Mr. Bartleman is a member of the Mnjikaning First Nation.
